Editorials

Rushing Again

Rushing is over, leaving in its wake as usual a crop of hurt feelings-not only of girls who did not make a fraternity, but more than that, of alumnæ who are bitter in their disappointment over girls whom they recommended to chapters but who were not pledged-the Editor can sympathize, since she did not do too well herself, this year! yet as always the judgment of the chapter must be final, since it is the active members who must spend their college years with that girl. Especially does the question of legacies (again that hated word!) come up, with the old discussion as to whether the Fraternity nationally should require that all legacies be taken. That would be ideal, from the standpoint of the legacy and her mother and sister, but impossible of attainment under present systems of membership choice, at least. What about the chapter which has 25 legacies on its rush list, and a quota of 19? There are many chapters so restricted-and it is obviously impossible to limit our pledging to legacies.

So we say again, let's be good sports about rushing results-and devote ourselves to making the Fraternity nationally stronger than ever, and the individual chapters more than ever loyal to the principles of Pi Beta Phi.

International Council of Women

Pi Beta Phi was fortunate indeed in having Amy Burnham Onken, in her capacity of chairman of National Panhellenic Conference, attend the Triennial Conference of the International Council of Women, held in Philadelphia, September 5 to 12, 1947. The first such meeting since before the European War began in 1939, the gathering had deep significance for all women, and especially so for the fraternity women of America, who were for the first time taking part in it. It brings close to us all the responsibility to play a definite part in such world affairs as this. Miss Onken has sent out a full report of the meeting to all clubs and chapters, and for the benefit of members who have not had the opportunity to see it, the ARROW will hope to have a similar report from Miss Onken in the next issue.

We Apologize Again

The September ARROW was late, and again unavoidably so. It must always wait for the report of the auditors of the fraternity finances, both national and Settlement School-both of these were late, because with the Fraternity closing its accounts July 31, and the auditors getting the material the following week, the material did not come in until the last of September.

Again the ARROW will be limited in size this year-with two factors contributing to this-the continuing shortage of paper, and the greatly rising costs of publication. Again the vicious spiral of rising prices, and diminished income from endowment are combining-and in consequence much fine material must be omitted this year. Bear with us, and hope for better things in the shape of tumbling prices and increasing income!

Will You Organize a New Club?

Sometimes there comes to the Editor's desk something so timely, so compelling that it makes us give up our space to it-much as we love to fill this space ourselves! This time it is an article from a recent graduate, Laurie Pritchard, Virginia Gamma, who will be remembered at the last Convention.

"If you look at the statistics you will find that the cost of living in the northeastern states is higher than in any other section of the country. And if you look at your atlas you will find that the population is denser in the northeastern states than in any other part of the country. *But*, if you look at your ARROW you will find that there are fewer Pi Beta Phi alumnæ clubs in the northeastern states than in any other section.

"Let's look at the figures. (Apologies to the Canadian clubs, we're going to leave them out because their population distribution presents a problem we're not able to cope with.)

"In Alpha Province East and in Alpha Province West there are 16 alumnæ clubs in seven states. In the remaining 41 states there are 195 alumnæ clubs. This means that the northeastern states average 2.3 clubs per state while the rest of the country averages 4.7 clubs per state. This is bad. But you haven't seen anything yet! Let's look at population. These same seven states claim 16% of the nation's population, and yet they have only 7.5% of the alumnæ clubs.

"Now let us assume that Pi Phis are evenly distributed throughout the country. If we also assume that there are approximately 39,000 living members, then we shall find three Pi Phis in every 10,000 persons. And if this is so, we shall also find 6,500 Pi Phis in the northeastern states. But, where are they? Let's see.

"If we use our 3 in every ten thousand as a good round figure, we find that Connecticut is hiding 512; Maine, 254; Massachusetts, 1,295; New Hampshire, 147; New York, 4,043; Rhode Island, 214; and Vermont, 107.

"And why have I spent so much time adding and dividing to arrive at these figures? To build up the ego of other sections of the country? No. To tear down the morale of the 16 alumnæ clubs in the northeastern area? No! To make those New Englanders and New Yorkers who live in congested areas aware that there are other Pi Phis within a stone's throw? YES.

"If you live in an area where there is no organized club or group, how are you to find the other Pi Phis? Here's a suggestion. Take it upon yourself to do the job. Put an item in your local paper that you're having a meeting of local Pi Phis in your home. You may be alone the first time, or maybe you'll get only one or two responses. Try it again. Every Pi Phi brought into your group is a potential member of a potential alumnæ club. And remember that the war has displaced many people. You may find half a dozen sisters in the wine and blue just around the corner. It's worth a try, and if you believe in proverbs, 'try, try again.'

"If you do not succeed in establishing a club, you will at least succeed in finding some of those same friendships you enjoyed so much as an undergraduate."



Pi Beta Phi Comes to Bradley University

P^I BETA PHI has come to Bradley." This is the glad news which was so thrilling to local Lambda Phi's and Pi Beta Phi alumnæ who had so earnestly wanted to see the fraternity represented by an undergraduate chapter in this area.

It was on May 17, 1947, that Illinois O started its career at Bradley University as Illinois' sixth chapter, ninety-second in the fraternity chapter roll. A well organized and functioning group of 600 Lambda Phis, in existence since 1901, disappeared from the campus at Bradley University and into its place stepped Pi Beta Phi. Chi Omega preceded us to the campus by only a few weeks, and Sigma Kappa installed at the same time as we did. It was the culmination of an "ardent courtship" that began some eight months previously between Lambda Phi and Pi Beta Phi. Through the aggressive and persistent suitor, Lambda Phi, felt it was a long and variable courtship, tradition tells us it was of unusually short duration. Mrs. Clifford W. Lott was one of our very first Pi Beta Phi friends who was interested in Lambda Phi. Her untiring work and efforts for us during the entire time of petitioning were invaluable in arousing fraternity interest and in helping us plan for our part of the petitioning.

After much correspondence from both groups, a tryst was planned through the visit of Mrs. Robert S. Wild, Grand Vice-President. She attended our annual Lambda Phi Founders' Day Banquet in February which was attended by two hundred-fifty of our actives and local alumnæ, toured the campus and interviewed the president, deans, and faculty heads. Both sides were convinced that it was a case of mutual admiration and the romance progressed! More animated correspondence followed and the second tryst was planned- another official visit, from Mrs. Lawrence A. Burley, Province President, and the province representatives from the undergraduate chapters. They were entertained informally, and also taken on a conducted tour of the campus, meeting the president, deans and faculty. A tea was given at the lovely home overlooking the Illinois River of Mrs. Mahler Wilson, Lambda Phi alumna, to which all actives and alumnæ were invited, giving the visitors and the Peoria Club an opportunity to further know the group. Miraculously, the mutual admiration continued! From then on, it was a matter of the Peoria Pi Beta Phi

Club, and the Lambda Phi actives and alumnæ working out details with Grand Council to make our beautiful dream come true.

Our dream finally came true when we received official notice from Miss Amy Burnham Onken that we had been granted a charter. Our memories of long-waiting were obliterated by the thrills ahead of us. In retrospection, I marvel that so many events could be crowded into two short weekends. Beginning May 8, early in the morning and extending through all the next day Mrs. James Webster and Mrs. Willis Bruniga pledged undergraduates and alumnæ to Pi Beta Phi.

Our next thrill was upon the arrival of the diminutive and ever-charming Miss Amy Onken who drove from her home in Chapin, Illinois, to officiate at the initiation and installation. We were delighted to have Mrs. Robert S. Wild, Mrs. Lawrence A. Burley, and Mrs. Frank B. Wood present to assist Miss Onken with the ceremonies. We were also happy they were able to arrive in time for the annual Lambda Phi Chorus Recital.

Initiation began the morning of May 15, and continued until noon, May 17. A total of one hundred forty-seven undergraduates and alumnæ joined the ranks of Pi Beta Phi. Thursday evening the Peoria Alumnæ Club entertained with a "cooky-shine" at the City Women's Club.

The formal installation banquet was held at Block and Kuhl Skyline Dining Room on Saturday evening, May 17. The dining room was spacious and beautifully arranged for "The First Nighter," a play in three acts. A wine and silver blue arrow hung above the speakers' table which was graced by a flower arrangement of wine and silver blue carnations, and corsage of the same at each place. Mrs. Carl O. Triebel, director, acted as toastmistress, and introduced Mrs. Lawrence Burley, Province President, who gave the prologue; the cast including Mrs. Frank Wood, Province Vice-President; Mrs. Robert Wild, Grand Vice-President; Mrs. Nettie Jobst Franke, only Lambda Phi founder living in Peoria, and Miss Amy Onken, Grand President, who gave the epilogue. Miss Sally Stubblefield, extension chairman, and Miss Betty Jane Seabury, banquet chairman, read the many notes and messages of congratulations and good wishes which had been pouring in.

A Glimpse of the University

BRADLEY POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE was founded in 1897 through the generosity and foresight of a very wealthy Peoria woman, Mrs. Lydia Moss Bradley. At that time there were but two buildings, and the faculty consisted of only fourteen instructors on the twenty-six acre campus. The number of students was limited to one hundred and fifty. This spring Bradley celebrated its Golden Anniversary, having achieved fame, undreamed of by its founder—its ever expanding sphere, a nucleus for educational ideals, with one hundred sixtyone faculty members, and three thousand students filling the university to capacity.

Dr. William Rainey Harper, first president of the University of Chicago, was also the first president of Bradley. Bradley's chances for recognition as a leader among privately endowed institutions were retarded for a time by the fact that it was originally founded as an academy and junior college; the junior college was dropped in 1920, and the corporate-name

was changed in July 1946, long after it had become, in fact, a university. Bradley's early junior college status prevented the establishment of chapters of the leading national social and honorary fraternities. With the change to the university name and the official status, very rapid progress is being made in the curricular expansion, faculty enlargement and enrichment. Our new president, David Blair Owen, has been instrumental in promoting the expansion plans for Bradley. The funds now have been largely raised for a handsome new library building, which it is hoped may be started this fall. The first two units of the auditorium-field house have been completed, and it was used for the Golden Anniversary Celebration, as well as Convocation. Plans have been accepted for new dormitories, construction depending upon the availability of necessary materials, and plans are also under way for numerous other buildings.

The Birth of Illinois Theta

N LOOKING back through the past year, one always remembers the little things as well as the big. Last year there was a local sorority on the campus of Bradley University which ranked tops. It had developed through many years with excellent leadership, and even though it was the only chapter by its name, it was considered outstanding.

In the middle of 1946 big things began to happen—a lonely organization looked toward a far-way goal. They hoped and prayed that they could pass the test to reach this new element. They pulled together their interests which had been rather lacking, and seriously undertook a new opportunity—an opportunity they had waited for years to obtain.

At last their dream was fulfilled, and Pi Beta Phi became theirs. The more they learned about Pi Beta Phi, the more absorbed they became until at last the intensity of such a step was upon them, and they strove to build on such an excellent foundation. The group found new strength and they now stand together as if a wire had been wound around them. Their common interest was and is to give themselves to Pi Beta Phi wholeheartedly, and today almost a year after the beginning you can see the change in every girl.

Our Pi Beta Phi girl has a new spirit, a stronger common interest, the will to give more than they take, a true wine and blue friendship —each one wearing her Arrow proudly as if it were a shining light.

These girls who worked and wanted Pi Beta Phi appreciate their acceptance more than anyone could explain. College education does not always limit itself to the text book, but extends into every contact one makes. Pi Beta Phi is showing the way to this "baby" chapter by constructing worthwhile contacts, eternal friendship, and a spirit that will never die as long as Illinois Θ lives in the hearts of its members.

Pi Beta Phi house corporations may borrow from the principal. Individual Pi Phis, in need, may receive benefit from the interest which is paid annually on the aforementioned loans to chapter house corporations.

That, in brief, is what will happen to the special fund of \$50,000 which was set aside by vote of the 1946 Convention.

Inspired by the same compelling force which motivated the founding of our Settlement School and planned as another fitting tribute to our distinguished and loved humanitarian, the fund was designated as—The Emma Harper Turner Memorial Fund. Many years ago the late Miss Turner wisely led Pi Beta Phi into the way of sharing which has given us strength and dignity. This particular expression of our sharing is to help our own members.

A committee of three was duly appointed. Very soon the detailed plan for the proper distribution of this fund will be presented to each Alumnæ Club.

Figure for yourself the possible interest upon the loans from the principal. Truly it is not a large amount to distribute for personal aid. You can readily see that it will not pay off all the worrisome mortgages, or paint all the fences white, or even begin to set up in business every deserving Pi Phi.

But perhaps you may know of a darling Pi Phi whose life again could be made happy and useful if she could shift her burden to a new hearing device or onto a Seeing Eye Dog. It will be the little "big needs" which rightly can be served.

For the first year the maximum sum which may go to an individual Pi Phi may not exceed \$180.00. Even then perhaps only ten or twelve can be helped. But think of the fun in store when we share ten times!

Quite naturally the greatest good will be accomplished if all requests are considered in confidence. Grand Council will check the committee endeavor.





Holt House is gradually taking on a more finished appearance; and this committee and the previous Holt House committees believe, that Pi Phis for generations to come, will be grateful to this generation for restoring it, and making it a lasting memorial to the founding of our fraternity.


