NOW IS THE TIME TO SEND YOUR RECOMMENDATIONS

This year deadlines for sending recommendations to chapters have been set up. They are August 15, for fall and December 1, for spring. This procedure is on a trial basis and is an experiment in trying to solve some problems which have existed. So it behooves you to sit down now and write that important letter recommending your candidates for membership in Pi Beta Phi.

In this issue of THE ARROW you will find the names and addresses of Chapter Membership Chairmen and the dates during which their chapter will be conducting rush. (These listings begin on page 29.)

The names of cities and towns included in alumnæ club areas are also listed according to provinces. Below these listings you will find the names of the Alumnæ Club Recommendation Chairmen responsible for sending reference blanks to the chapters.

If you are not a member of the club which will supply you with the blank for the young woman you wish to recommend to a chapter for consideration you may order Confidential Reference forms from central office or write a letter to the alumnæ club chairman involved giving complete information including your name, address and chapter. State your maiden name if you are married.

Send a copy to the chapter, if you wish. If you are writing a letter or recommendation be sure to include all pertinent information.

If you are recommending a young woman living outside an area covered by an alumnæ club, write to the Chapter Membership Chairman giving the same information mentioned above.

Some of the most outstanding Pi Beta Phis come from rural areas. Yet, these are the areas from which we have the greatest difficulty obtaining information and recommendations. Consequently, a special plea is being made to those of you living in a rural community to help the chapters by sending recommendations to them.

Daughters of service personnel also present a very real problem because many have recently lived in foreign countries or are new in the community in which they now live. If you know any of these young women, and wish to recommend them, do it now by sending recommendations according to the instructions mentioned above.



Thirty-Three Years Behind Bars

A Self Imposed Sentence

In the green rolling hills of central Virginia, overlooking the James River, is a prison farm for women. For thirty-three years a loyal Pi Phi has striven to replace the jail-like atmosphere with beauty and hope for the women committed there. Miss Elizabeth Kates came to the State Industrial Farm for Women as Superintendent at its establishment in 1931. A Pennsylvania Beta Pi Phi from Willow Grove, Pennsylvania, Miss Kates had served as a dietician at the State Home for Girls in Trenton, N.J. and as a deputy and stewardess at the first Federal Reformatory for Women in Alderson, West

Virginia.

When Betty Kates arrived in Goochland at the proposed site of the State Farm, there was one stucco building for prisoners and one small frame cottage for the staff. There was no rehabilitation program for the inmates, as the sole purpose at that time was a punitive one. Today, as a result of her vision and service, there are fifty-four buildings and a practical rehabilitation program which stands as a monument to her and to the Virginia State Legislature. An inmate once said, "Nobody could look out of her window at the many beautiful buildings and lovely landscaping and not come out a better person."

Under Miss Kates' direction, the State Industrial Farm for Women became self sufficient through its

program of rehabilitation.

The work on the two hundred and seventy-acre farm has provided practically all the food needed for the institution, with surplus sold to other penal institutions. In addition, a scientifically concentrated

vegetable garden, the care and shearing of sheep, a sanitary piggery, modern poultry houses, beef cattle and a rabbit warren were introduced. Methods in preserving, canning, freezing and the preparation and serving of foods institute the training of cooks and waitresses in the modern kitchens, bakery and dining rooms, enabling many women to become selfsupporting when they leave the farm.

A modern laundry does all the laundry of the institution, as well as that of the Medical College of Virginia, Beaumont School for Boys and several smaller institutions. Rehabilitated prisoners are being sought for employment in laundries from all over the south because of their training at the farm.

Educational opportunities through high school are provided, and correspondence courses in specialized fields to suit specific needs broadens the curriculum.

In the sewing room, girls are trained to make the garments worn by the inmates. There is a craft shop where weaving of draperies, rugs and bed spreads is taught under the direction of Mrs. Edna McCarter McFall, who received her training among the first craft students at Settlement School.

The State of Virginia spent annually about one thousand dollars for flowers for state functions, until Miss Kates talked the governor into giving the farm a thousand dollars one year to build and stock a green house. Since that time the Farm has provided all the flowers for the Governor's Mansion and other state buildings, saving the state a great deal of money. Each year, the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts is transformed into the magic of Christmas by hundreds of poinsettias grown by the Farm.

In 1942, under the auspices of the May L. Keller Alumnæ Club of Pi Beta Phi, the ELIZABETH KATES FONDATION was chartered. Although the state provides for the needs of a felon when released, no such provision is made for a misdemeanant, who constitutes the majority of prisoners. These needs were first met by the Alumnæ Club, but later the Foundation was broadened to include persons and groups from all over the State of Virginia. The Foundation is able to help a prisoner become a better citizen upon her release into society by providing seasonal garments from the "Clothes Rack," a travel ticket from the state line to her destination, the cost of the first weeks living expenses, or a loom to enable her to support herself. In addition, the Foundation pays for correspondence courses and special equipment such as tape recorders, choir robes and artist supplies. It supports budget requests for better health care, the religious life and other benefactions,

and is a working tribute to the woman who inspired

it's organization.

Betty Kates has served as President of the May L. Keller Alumnæ Club. She has been a member of the board and President of the Richmond Altrusa Club, to which she was elected an honorary member in 1959. She is a member of the PEO Sisterhood and the Business and Professional Women's Club. A highlight of her life came in June, 1951 when her own Bucknell University conferred on her an L.L.D.

An inmate at the State Industrial Farm for Women can count on teaching, training, supervision, recreation, close medical attention, exercise, and a chance of recognition of her talents. She has her own small room in which to reflect, to pursue further work in her chosen field or hobby and to

work out her own problems.

Pampering? No. Firmness was Betty Kates watchword. And to prove her vision was sound, there is an extremely low record of parole violations-less than six per cent, for which she has received national and international prestige. Miss Kates' administration was marked by firm discipline, educational opportunities according to ability and length of sentence, and a training program for adjustment to the environment to which the inmate would be released.

"Environment is so important", Miss Kates has said. "To withstand the social pressures of today, every child must have education and good home sur-

roundings."

Asked how to rear a child to avoid crime, Miss Kates has stated, "love the child, be companionable, give him a balanced diet and dress him suitably. Love of family, love of man and religious teachings are the overall necessities for rich or poor, but children of more fortunate families should especially be taught to do an honest day's work and to honor the

The women of the Farm do not change overnight. Between the pronouncement of the prison sentence and the finding of new ways of life, there are tears, rebellion, discipline, solemn resolutions, struggle for self control, screams in the night and prayer. Miss Kates knew that some inmates might never straighten out their lives, but she was also confident that with proper guidance and encouragement, the majority could become decent and responsible citizens.

Letters come daily from thankful "graduates." One writes of the joy of teaching a Sunday School class. Another led the community in reopening a

closed church "and now it's growing."

". . . When I get letters from the girls who have left here and made worthwhile citizens of them-

selves, I realize more than ever how important it is to help people. In this type of service for my fellow man, I am grateful for a part."

On the eve of her retirement in December, 1964, a resident of the Farm described the feeling of all for their friend. "We light candles at Christmas time. To us, Miss Kates is a 'Lighted Candle' that shines brightest when things are darkest. She always has kind words, a smiling face and a wonderful sense of humor. She is known throughout the United States for her great work in our Institution. She is one who does not seek publicity but helps her girls quietly and efficiently. It is her belief that every girl who enters the gates of Goochland can benefit by her stay here and leave a much better person. Miss Kates has lighted candles for thousands of women in prison; if one can call this Institution a prison."

Frank W. Smyth, Jr., director of the Division of Correction in the State of Virginia said of her: "We are deeply indebted to her for the fine program outstanding in its field and the atmosphere she has created at the Women's Farm."

The May L. Keller Alumnæ Club takes pride in the fact that it has been so closely associated with this outstanding woman for many years and has had some part in the work that merits national recognition at the Farm. All Pi Phis can stand in tribute to a sister of courage, who has spent thirty-three years behind bars, a sentence self-imposed.

"Happy Marriages

Don't Just Happen"

Making Marriage Work

With freedom of choice in marriage partners, a new goal in marriage relationships has come into being—individual happiness. It's a very difficult thing to describe; it means different things to each of us.

The emphasis now is on psychological and personality factors, on companionship and equality between husband and wife. Women have greater freedom in our democratic American family than one finds anywhere else in the world. Marriage partners choose one another and are intensely dependent upon each other, since satisfying relationships and understanding between the partners is the expected result if the marriage is to be happy. But freedom of choice calls for responsibility to choose wisely and to try to make your marriage a success. Thus, it takes more love and understanding to make a success of marriage today because we expect more of marriage.

The degree of happiness in marriage depends upon the ratio between what one expects and what one experiences. Happy marriages don't "just happen"; you have to work for the success of your marriages.

What are some guide lines one can follow to try

to achieve happiness in marriage?

1. Be sensitive to your husband's or wife's feelings and moods. Consider his or her needs before your own.

Hopefully each of the marital partners is able to function capably most of the time, but each should be able to be dependent upon the other for emotional support in times of stress. The husband gives his wife the security she needs when she is pregnant, for example, by his consideration and understanding of her concerns and worries. The husband, too, should be able to relax and be helpless when the situation warrants it (if he loses his job or meets some other unexpected crises) without feeling any loss of self-esteem.

2. Don't criticize or nag unduly lest self-respect be diminished and your happiness together be in jeop-

ardy.

Instead of criticism, express your ideas as suggestions. Each of us resents criticism because in our childhood it was associated with hostility. Nagging, too, merely causes a reaction of irritation and never achieves the desired goal.

3. Don't be afraid your husband no longer loves you when he flares up occasionally and releases tension in sharp words when the cause lies elsewhere.

Bob usually liked to relax a bit when he came home before having dinner and said, "What's the rush?" if dinner was waiting. But recently Janet had been at a meeting and was rushing to get things started for dinner, feeling a little guilty because she hadn't realized it was so late. When Bob came in, she called. "Dinner will be a little late tonight, dear." "I should think you could have dinner ready when I get home," he responded.

Janet was sure Bob couldn't really love her if he could look so angry and snap at her like that. But in reality, it had been a bad day. A sale he had thought secure hadn't materialized, and the sales manager had seemed to think it was his fault. He couldn't release his tension in his presence, and his thoughts were filled with tension over the lack of understand-

ing of his efforts.

4. Try to nurture a sense of humor. Good humor shows in the faces of those who have this great asset.

They show understanding and they make us feel happy. Remember the bright or funny things that occur during your day away from each other and enjoy them together.

Look for reasons behind your behavior and try to understand the motivations of your husband.

In this way, understanding may add to the essential satisfactions that each of you find in your union.

Remember that each of you brought to your marriage from your early childhood different backgrounds, different personalities, beliefs, familiar ways of doing things that have become a part of you. As Dr. Lawrence K. Frank says, "We are what we are because we've been what we've been."

You could not, therefore, expect to agree about everything. Adjustments will be necessary, not 50/50 by each of you, but a willingness to go more than half way. Flexibility and the ability to adjust are among the most important factors in achieving a good marriage.

6. Talk to your husband about the many things that happen or in which you are interested, big or

small, deep or light, and listen with attentive and sympathetic interest, thus keeping alive the essential habit of communication between you.

Happiness in marriage is enhanced by sharing

ideas and ideals.

7. Don't try to impose your will on your mate nor

deny interests other than your own.

Your mate is not your property but is a person quite apart from you. As you learn to give and give in at times and to discuss decisions before they are made, you enhance the health of your marriage.

8. Keep the dignity of your marriage inviolate. Never demean its sacredness in public or private. Not only does it hurt the feelings of the marriage partner, but it is embarrassing to the friends who are exposed to your personal disputes.

9. Pray together in your place of worship, for

love is blessed in the aura of Godliness.

10. Uphold truth in your marriage. Never practice deceit, whatever its motives.

Respect for each other is as vital as love to assure

life-long happiness together.

But sometimes even marriages that start out well develop problems. When couples marry, they are in love, they believe their marriage will bring them only happiness; they meet each other's emotional needs. They feel happy and comfortable together. There is a BALANCE in their interpersonal rela-

tionships.

When they start having marital problems something has happened to that balance; to their relationship. This might have been affected by internal or external pressures. Usually, each individual prefers to think he isn't responsible, and it must have been something outside of himself that caused the rift. Counseling helps individuals become aware of their own personal involvements. Sometimes couples then can work out their problems and re-establish the balance in their marital relationships.

Here are some danger signals.

First, lack of communication. Married couples must be able to talk things over even when they don't agree. Each of us needs someone to whom she can express hostility, be furious and say so without having the feeling that she does not love her husband and is not loved in return. No two persons' emotional needs are so completely matched that there is no frustration, and whenever there is frustration, there is hostility. Indifference is possible when you're not in love—but not when love exists.

Others talk at each other, not to each other. Those of you who have heard Leonard Bernstein's opera, "Trouble in Tahiti," remember what he calls the "screaming silence." In the opera, there is a Greek chorus which explains what each of the marriage partners means to say. Unfortunately, in life, there is no such chorus, and misunderstandings, not discussed and settled, can mushroom into serious prob-

Lack of communication between the husband and wife sometimes brings about over-involvement by one or the other with their children; or one or the other or both become too involved with social life, filling time with meaningless activities. Some couples seem unable to enjoy being together, such as Mr. and Mrs. Jerold.

Mrs. Jerold, the mother of two young children felt very depressed. Her husband came home tired, was disinterested in going out and generally was glued to the TV set. He was the silent, self-sufficient type. "It wasn't at all like it had been when we were in college; he just seemed to live for the time we could be together then," said the wife, who came for counseling help. The husband came, also, because he

wanted to save their marriage.

This wife was helped to accept herself as a more mature figure. The man was helped to recognize that a woman who has to give so much to young children and has no adult company during the day needs more emotional satisfaction, more emotional support than he was giving. He faced up to the problems involved in fatherhood.

Another signal is found where a wife has vague feelings that she is not needed—the woman who feels that all of her husband's time and interest is centered in his business, so that he has no need of her. When they were first married they discussed all his business affairs, but now he seems to act as if she were not able to understand them.

The third signal is that of a power struggle. The person wants to be in control so that he can have his or her dependent needs met, but he or she still wants to be boss. There is increased disagreement as to details of homemaking, of management of money, of the children, or of management of their leisure

time. For example, there are the Ardens.

Mrs. Arden, who had been married for 2½ years, came for counseling to evaluate her marriage. She described her husband as selfish, overly critical of her, and his approach to almost everything, in particular to her ideas or wishes, as negativistic. She commented that in recent months they argued about everything, so much so that at times even they could see the humor of the situation.

She had worked since her marriage, and her husband was now established in his work to the point they could plan to have a family. However, she felt very insecure about having a child when their relationship was so unstable. Mr. and Mrs. Arden had similar economic, religious and cultural backgrounds. She and her husband had gotten along very well until his family began to take over plans for the marriage, when for the first time, she realized that her husband was influenced by his family. Since their marriage, she felt that his family were in and out of the house as if it were "Grand Central station."

Mrs. Arden had a very close relationship with her own parents and had actually been quite indulged

as a young child, when she often cried or had temper tantrums if she could not obtain the things she wanted. Her husband was concerned about their relationship, too. He considered his wife immature and felt not only that she was critical of his family but that she could not recognize the extent to which

she was involved with her parents.

Actually, Mr. and Mrs. Arden's complaints about each other were quite similar. These young people were so involved with their respective families that they could not use their energy to work out their own relationships. They were behaving like rivalrous siblings. Each wanted to be the favorite child. Mrs. Arden did not allow herself to feel or act like an adult, instead she continued to act like a bad child. Mr. Arden, in turn, was provocative or rejecting, and this interaction persisted until they were helped to become aware of the pattern. When they were able to look at what they were doing rather than focus on what the other person had done, they had taken the first step toward a more mature and satisfying relationship.

The fourth signal shows where there is increased resentment on the part of the wife regarding her husband's work or on the part of the husband re-

garding management of the home.

The last signal of danger ahead that I shall mention is that of feeling let down with experiences when reality doesn't meet ones expectations and the person is bored most of the time.

The psychologically healthy individual is not bored but is able to be alone. The feeling of being shut out or feeling he or she will not be understood is illustrated by the case of the Perkens.

Mrs. Perken came to the agency during a period

of distress involving personal discouragement and the possibility of divorce after 20 years of fairly successful married life. Both she and her husband were forcing one another to the brink of divorce, although neither really wanted such a solution. Their teen-age son and daughter were discouraged and somewhat confused.

During the course of her interviews, the source of Mrs. Perken's discouragement became clearer. She felt inadequate and used and abused by her family. She had felt this way during her early adolescence, when her mother died suddenly and she was left to assume much of the family responsibility. During this important period of her life, she saw her father as a cold, strict, but reliable man. She was angry with him because she was not able to experience the

indulgence her young siblings received. Although it came slowly, Mrs. Perken was able to recognize that her father was quite dependent upon her and that she did have a close, satisfactory relationship to him, as demonstrated in later life when he relied upon her rather than her siblings. Her interviews provided a source of dependency and acceptance. As she gained confidence, she was able to express some of her wishes and feelings directly. Much to her surprise, her husband responded with greater interest and consideration.

The most important factor in achieving a happy marriage would seem to be the degree of emotional maturity of the marital partners. Dr. William Menninger has said that the most important factor in personal happiness and effectiveness is the ability to get along well with other people. It depends upon

whether you can love more than you hate.

What is your capacity to love? The love I mean is that which the Greeks called agape. That love means considering the wishes, the desires, the goals of your husband (or wife) before your own, rejoicing in his or her accomplishments, sharing his trials as well as his triumphs.

Today more than ever before American youths need the examples of successful marriages which educated men and women can give them. We who believe in family life as the basic relationship in our culture must by our example illustrate its value.

We echo the words of the poet, William Cowper:

"What is there in the vale of life Half so delightful as a wife, When friendship, love, and peace combine To stamp the marriage-bond divine?"

Pi Phi Finds

'World of Understanding' In Africa

From the Pittsburgh Press

The stormy continent of Africa seems foreboding to most Americans, but the family of Dr. Carroll Reynolds of Mt. Lebanon, Pa., tends to think of it in terms of contrasts and great promise.

Mrs. Reynolds, a member of the Pittsburgh-South Hills Alumnæ Club, talked about her six months in Nigeria with her husband and two daughters, Marilyn and Beverly.

The Reynolds lived on the University of Ibadan campus where Dr. Reynolds was sent by the Rockefeller Foundation as consultant to the medical librarian at the University of Ibadan.

Nigeria, Mrs. Reynolds reminded, gained its independence only four years ago. Although it is gaining prosperity, there is still much of the despair associated with an underdeveloped country.

As a teacher of home economics, Mrs. Reynolds was concerned with the welfare of children. The No. 1 killer among children in Nigeria is kwahiorkor, caused by a mineral and protein deficiency.

"You see peanuts galore in the country," injected her daughter Marilyn, a senior at the University of Pittsburgh, "but they won't touch peanut butter sandwiches which most children love."

"But the Nigerians realize the importance of education," Mrs. Reynolds stressed. "They want to give more nutrition and consumer training. And they have new programs to reduce the shortage of teachers and medical personnel."

Another aim of the schools, Mrs. Reynolds related, is to save the African crafts that are fast becoming extinct with industrialization. Some of the manual skills still flourish.

"Every 16 days the 'native cloth market' opens at 6 a.m." she said. "Here one may buy hand-woven cloth, ornate embroidery, pottery and jewelry."

The Nigerian women buy this cloth which has been designed free hand and dyed in backyard caldrons, to use as wrapped skirts or to tie babies onto their backs.

Despite the political problems unfolding within Nigeria, the Reynolds found the people pro-American.

"An American friend of mine said she felt like Queen Elizabeth as she strolled the streets, for children everywhere gaily greeted her," she noted.

But the ubiquitous threat of tribal allegiance in Africa was brought home to Mrs. Reynolds when she visited a northern university.

"At the time of our presidential elections, a Nigerian student asked why I wanted to vote for Johnson or Goldwater if he weren't from my home state of Pennsylvania," she said.

"He said he would never vote for a man unless he were from his own tribal region."

Although there are three tribal languages in Nigeria, plus 247 dialects, the Reynolds found enough people were educated in government and missionary schools that they could travel without a translator.

They met people from many continents working together to give a portion of their knowledge to this new nation.

"It created a world of understanding for us," related Mrs. Reynolds. "If more people had had such an opportunity, there might be less prejudice and more friendship among peoples."

The wonderful feature of the summer Workshop sessions is versatility-according to individual needs.

GERTRUDE C. FORD, A Rose by Any Name, A. S.

Barnes and Co., Inc., 302 pp.

The lure of mystery, the challenge of a crusade, the appeal of logic—all these are operative as one reads "A Rose By Any Name" which should earn supporters for the author's theory that the incomparable literature attributed to the man called Shakespeare was actually the product of Edward de Vere, Earl of Oxford.

It has long been recognized among such men of letters as Mark Twain, Coleridge, and Emerson that the preponderance of evidence indicates the name Shakespeare is a nom de plume. Not one of the six known signatures of the barely educated man who lived in Stratford is spelled the same, and it is a matter of record that his father's name was Shaxbere.

The plays and sonnets themselves proclaim their author an astute student of human behavior, an artist in the arrangement of words, and a storyteller both imaginative and creative. Furthermore, and of prime significance to Mrs. Ford's premise, they reveal an intimate factual knowledge of Elizabethan court and a familiarity with the world and its affairs available only to a chosen few in the sixteenth century.

But why cast the Earl of Oxford as the True

Shakespeare? Why not Bacon, or Marlow, or Kyd or Essex to name a few who have strong champions? These were men of intellect, taste, and knowledge who wrote well and might have been the Bard of Avon. Long before she herself thought of dealing with the problem Gertrude Ford read the conflicting arguments and remained unconvinced by any. There never seemed to be an adequate reason why this possible Shakespeare or that one would chose anonymity, and Mrs. Ford could not justify substituting one hoax for another.

When she became familiar with the Oxfordian case, however, she responded to its apparent validity and found herself intrigued and challenged to the point of conducting a personal search for evidence to support the theory: that a romance between Oxford and Queen Elizabeth produced a son, brought up as Henry Wriothesley (pronounced Rosely), third Earl of Southampton; that the romance inspired many of the sonnets and plays, and that Elizabeth's status as the Virgin Queen and the power the monarchy derived from that status would be threatened and their relationship given credence were Oxford recognized as the author.

Here was a case whose reasoning Mrs. Ford could accept; at the same time, however, she felt instinctively that Oxford would have resented both the Queen's unwillingness to acknowledge their son and the latter's claim to the throne and as a corollary the withholding of recognition for his own literary genius. Oxford, she theorized, would have written out his anguish for himself and his son as well as his frustrated love for Elizabeth and he would have deliberately left clues to his authorship.

On this assumption Mrs. Ford commenced the search for those clues and was amply rewarded, so amply, in fact, that coincidence almost has to be ruled out, except the coincidence that provided a real person with a similar name to serve as a front for the muzzled genius.

Happily for the reader Mrs. Ford's contribution toward solving the Shakespeare enigma did not end with a careful re-reading of all the plays and sonnets in her methodical search for clues to the truth, nor is their presentation a pedestrian one.

Her case for Oxford is told in highly readable verse and her precise annotations showing the source of each clue and fact are printed in parallel columns, a thoughtful arrangement which frees the reader from repeated shifts to bottoms of pages or to the back of the book for corroboration.

Mrs. Ford feels strongly the desire to right the injustice she believes the true Shakespeare has

suffered for four centuries, and she has made a vigorous case for Oxford, one which earned the enthusiastic support of Francis T. Carmody, until his death in February, America's leading Oxfordian, who wrote the book's introduction.

There will be persons who will question, "What matter all this? It's the work that counts." Perhaps, however, it was never more important than now in a world of automation and atomic threat that men have and retain stature commensurate to their own creations. Whether or not Gertrude Ford's case for Oxford is ever absolutely validated, her book is a valid statement in behalf of great and lasting literatures being the product of human emotion, involvement in life, and judgement as well as of human intellect and invention.

AUTHOR INTEREST: Georgia-born Gertrude Castellow (Mrs. Aaron) Ford, D.C. Alpha, is the wife of former U.S. Representative Aaron Ford, a Jackson, Miss., attorney, and the daughter of a former representative as well. Although until comparatively recent years her main interest was in the literature of antiquity, she first questioned the man from Stratford's literary role when, as a seventh

grader, she first read his scanty and commonplace personal history. Chance reading of some other theories on the subject started her own delving, first for her own amusement and ultimately with a firm dedication to right an injustice. She has maintained her participation in Pi Phi which included helping

found Mississippi Alpha.

RANDOM NOTES: MARTHA EADS WARD, Illinois Beta-Delta, children's librarian for the Quincy, III., Free Public Library, has collaborated with her assistant, Dorothy A. Marquardt, to produce a reference work, Authors of Books for Young People, which contains 1030 biographies. Included are all Newbery and Caldecott Medal winners but otherwise preference was given to contemporary authors whose biographies proved difficult to locate. Mrs. Ward began her academic preparation at Knox College, was graduated from the University of Southern California in Los Angeles, and received her library training at Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, N.Y. She is currently chairman, Children's Librarians' Section, Illinois Library Association, and recently authored an article, "Seven Years in the Space Age," for the journal Illinois Libraries.

Women's Judicial Board-Student Sounding Board at Duke

At Duke University the Women's Judicial Board has been the leading sounding board concerning the new challenges to the "southern" code of campus living. Pi Phis Linda Orr (Judicial Board Chairman), Jeremy Hewes, Monica Stevenson, Karen West, and Brenda Koll have contributed their efforts toward creating a campus atmosphere where the rules and regulations are coincident with the needs of the students and the standards of the University.

From Freshman Week until Graduation, the women students are encouraged to voice their opinions and demands through their dormitory judicial representatives. The Judicial Board serves the dual role of arbiter of rule infractions, and innovator of campus-student policy. At a typical weekly meeting, the Board will act as an investigating committee which will consider all facets of a rule in question. After several weeks of discussion, the Judicial Board will make a recommendation to the Women's College Deans. In making their decision, the Deans have a detailed analysis of student body sentiment and a thorough listing of possible results of the proposed rule change.

A pertinent example is the proposed revision of the Woman's College drinking rule. This has come about as a result of the decision last spring semester by the administration of Trinity College (the men's sector of the University on West Campus), which approved permitting alcoholic beverages in the fraternity dorm chapter rooms and independent dorm social rooms on the men's campus. Subsequently, there was a demand for the reconsideration of the Woman's College rule which prohibits the possession, or transportation of any alcoholic beverages on East Campus. The Judicial Board in its study was not necessarily appealing for a relaxation of respected rules, but rather an administrative recognition of student trends, and the strain on rules that are not sufficiently reviewed as the new situations arise. For a majority of the fall semester, the Woman's College Judicial Board considered the problem, and then presented its findings to its Dean. The proposed change of rules did not pass because of the living situation and the administration's concept of the role of the Woman's College at a southern university. Woman's College students would be allowed to drink alcoholic beverages in the approved areas on West Campus, but the reviewing committee chose to retain the standards of the Woman's College

The Judicial Board had competently served its purpose as a means to make the University authorities more aware of the transition situation of women students at southern universities.

March 25 was another happy day. On that date, Peggy Goldwater, became the thirtieth member of the pledge class, and an honor initiate of Pi Beta

Phi.

St. Lawrence Honors Alice Griswold

One name appears in all editions of Who's Who of American Women and in the annals of Pi Beta Phi.

She is Alice L. Griswold, New York Gamma, who was the only woman in a group of six, honored recently by St. Lawrence University in the 1964 Homecoming exercises.

Educator and editor, she has co-authored six textbooks.

Born in Canton of an old North Country family, she was graduated from Canton High School in 1916 and from St. Lawrence University in 1920. In 1938 she received her Master's Degree in education from New York University. At NYU, Alice was elected to Pi Lambda Theta, national honorary for women in education.

Her professional career started in 1920, and, spanning 40 years, was dedicated to the teaching of mathematics.

Her retirement from high school teaching followed 25 years at Garden City High School, Long Island N.Y.

With a flair for the executive, she has been supervisor of student teachers of mathematics at Adelphi University on Long Island, led a group on Construction of Effective Classroom Tests at Rutgers Mathematics Institute in New Jersey, and participated in Summer Workshops at Clarkson College of Technology in New York.

Active in the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, Alice Griswold was one of the founders in 1951 of the Association of Mathematics Teachers of New York State. During 1962-63 she was the president of the organization, which is the largest state association of its kind in the nation.

Since entering the teaching profession in 1920, she has been at the forefront of the movement to improve the teaching of mathematics through modernization of content and techniques.

In post retirement activities since 1960, she continued with the supervision of training of future teachers in the cadet teacher program at Adelphi University and, at present, is associate mathematics editor for Holt, Rinehart and Winston, and a member of the committee on state scholarship examinations in engineering.

St. Lawrence University took note of all these outstanding achievements in their citations to Alice L. Griswold last October and concluded by expression of "great pleasure in having this opportunity to recognize her highly successful career and her constant loyalty to her Alma Mater."



Geologist Has Rocks In Her Head

Some of Alice Payne's best friends are rocks.

And she's meeting new ones all the time, in her work-geology.

An adventuring spirit and a love of the outdoors led the attractive 24-year-old blond Alberta Alpha Pi Phi into this overwhelming male field.

As the only woman geologist in any Northwest Territories mining camp last summer, Miss Payne says, "the men were amazed to see a woman in the bush."

Taking her master of science degree in the geology of hard rocks at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Miss Payne was in Yellowknife doing field work for her thesis when she had an opportunity to go farther north.

She took her pick, packsack and bedroll and hitched a ride in a bush plane to Coronation Gulf, 75 miles within the Arctic Circle, where a mining syndicate was doing exploration work for gold.

"The men-14 geologists-promised I'd be treat-

ed just like any other geologist."

But they gave her a special tent with a cot, straw mattress, a stove and three oil drums with a plank across them for a dressing table. The men lived in one large tent with bunk beds and a stove.

"And the prospectors did all the cooking."

She spent a week in the Arctic camp, 975 miles north of Edmonton, collecting about 150 pounds of rock samples for further study here this winter. She also did reconnaissance work with other geologists and studied rock formations and the continental

Her thesis work for the university is on radio-active rocks from the Great Canadian Shield.

The tall, blue-eyed blonde says she prefers field work to being in the laboratory and likes a job that can take her "anywhere, anytime and under practically any conditions.'

She says it is hard for a woman geologist to find work in the field. She won't be hired into an allmale crew, and she can't go underground for mining companies, due to miners' superstitions.

But Miss Payne won't be too worried about placement in field work in her future. After her forthcoming marriage to Robin Leech, 27-year-old biologist, she'll be in the field with her husband.

The real fun came when the club's cash register rang up \$450 profit which was contributed to the chapter's new Pi Phi house now under construction.


Remember Jane Collins?
