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What would you do if you were editor of The ARROW? From time to time we hear grumbles about what is or what isn't in The ARROW . . . we shouldn't picture so many queens or fraternity sweethearts . . . we should have more news about the 'outside'' world, not strictly concerning Pi Beta Phi or the Greek system . . . etc., etc., etc., or we'd really like to give you an opportunity to express your desires concerning what you'd like to see in your magazine. Your criticism is always welcome—we might not like what you say and we may not agree with your premise, but at least it means that The ARROW is being read, and that's half the battle. We can't promise to publish all your letters, because we hope that many of you will respond, but we'll do the best we can. Please be sure to sign your name and chapter as well as your address. Now let's hear it out there from the silent majority as well as the vocal minority!

Periodically we find that we must re-state our policy on publishing pictures or information concerning fraternity auxiliary or "little sister" groups. The National Panhellenic Conference is greatly concerned about the growing influence of undergraduate women's auxiliary groups for men's fraternities, feeling that the activities of such groups are in conflict with National Panhellenic Conference policies. The avowed reason for the organization of fraternity auxiliaries is to promote fraternity philanthropies, help in fund raising projects, and other fraternal programs. Unfortunately such activities often mean that there is little time left to devote to promoting Pi Phi philanthropies, helping with Pi Phi fund raising and other fraternal programs. It is to be hoped that Pi Beta Phi interests would come first, and that if there is a conflict in scheduling, Pi Phi activities would get the nod. Since that is often not the case, we, personally, heartily endorse the NPC stand. Therefore, there will be no fraternity auxiliaries mentioned in The ARROW in the future, as there has been none in the past.

One of the stories in this issue concerns the excitement of Toronto Pi Phis when the second act of the musical, "Good News" opens with the song, "The Girls of Pi Beta Phi." Did you see the article in the April 15 *People* magazine about the show which is making a nationwide pre-Broadway tour? Right there, big as life, is a picture of Alice Faye, the star of the show, surrounded by "collegians," and on the sofa behind her is a pillow with the Greek letters, $\Pi B \Phi$. We think the whole thing is great and we hope to have an opportunity to see the show if it ever comes down Atlanta way.

Speaking of "collegians" gives us a perfect opportunity to air a personal pet peeve, and that is the use of the words "collegian" and "collegiate." The first is a noun, the second an adjective. Therefore, those who are attending college are collegians, and they are involved in collegiate activities. As former or current collegians, we should remember our collegiate training and use the words correctly. Right? Right!

A great idea for keeping in touch during the summer comes from Illinois Eta. Last summer Janie Hedlund served as coordinator, and consolidated messages in the form of a news-letter. According to the chapter, it was fun to hear what everyone was doing, it saved carbon copy letters, and it cut down considerably on the outlay for stamps.

It would be a great help to this editor if everyone would remember that the postmark deadline for next winter's issue is September 6.

Greetings from the University of California, Irvine! I am the youngest link in Pi Phi's chain of friendship, California Eta. My birth was on January 26, 1974, but I was in the thoughts of many long before.

Let me tell you about my hometown, Irvine, Calif. The University lies 4 miles inland from the Pacific Ocean, easily accessible to Newport Beach, Balboa Island, and Laguna Beach. It is one of the largest of the University of California campuses, covering over 1,510 acres. U.C.I. is increasing rapidly, with 8,472 students this year, including 1,030 graduate students and 680 medical students.

Our First Steps

Pi Phi officially arrived in Irvine in the form of Francee Hoeltgen, our resident "angel-indisguise," otherwise known as a live-in graduate counselor. She served as chapter president, vice president of moral, mental, and social, Panhellenic delegate, pledge trainer, music chairman, not to mention an invaluable encyclopedia of Pi Beta Phi heritage and tradition.

We began our toddling steps in October with formal rush, where we met our "older sisters to be" from San Diego State, U.C.L.A., and U.S.C., as well as other "famous arrows" such as Grand Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Elizabeth Hill; T.G.C.'s Molly Cressor and Ann Stege; our AAC Chairman, Patty Jenness; and our Province President Mrs. Ernestine Ohlson. On October 15, 38 shiny new darts were formally pledged at the Newport Beach home of alum Johanna Jonas. Cal. Eta was on its way! In open rush we gained five new pledges, bringing our number to 43.

Sunday night an active meeting was conducted by Julie Mendenhall.





Karen Sue Guice, a graduate of New Mexico State University and a member of one of Pi Beta Phi's newest chapters, New Mexico Beta, has been named recipient of the Pi Beta Phi Fellowship for 1974-75.

Karen has completed ten semester hours in graduate school in chemistry and is now attending medical school at the University of New Mexico. She received her bachelor of sci-

ence degree with honors from New Mexico State University in January, 1973. She was initiated into Pi Phi in her junior year when the New Mexico Beta chapter was installed, and was elected its first Vice President of Mental Advancement. Positive scholarship innovations, begun during her term of office, are being carried through by the active chapter at this time.

Following her freshman year at Baylor University, Karen transferred to N.M.S.U. and that year was Grand Worthy Advisor of New Mexico Rainbow for Girls, member of the state executive committee of Rainbow and attended the Grand Assembly in Canada. She was named to the Dean's List during all four college years, and her cumulative GPA was 3.564.

One of the highlights of her junior year occurred when the National Science Foundation awarded Karen a grant for research. She also accepted responsibility in her church by serving as a member of the Presbyterian Campus Ministry Formulation Committee.



"Hizzoner" Is Her Honor In Lawrence

In a historic, unanimous vote on April 10, 1973, the city commission elected Nancy Schnelli Hambleton, Pennsylvania Gamma, mayor of Lawrence, Kansas—the first woman ever to hold the post. Until that moment, she had been the city's first woman commission, elected to that post in the fall of 1970.

These two firsts are credited to a woman who never even planned to become involved in city government. However, the Citizens Committee for Good Government urged Nancy to run for the commission, based on her work with the League of Women Voters and other civic organizations. The rest is history.

As mayor, Nancy's main duty is presiding over the weekly city commission meetings and setting the direction of the commission's activities. "The job really does require a lot of homework," she says. "The reading is constant, with lots of reports, and then I still have things to do as a wife . . . and homemaker." She spends between 20 and 40 hours a week on her job.

Nancy's husband, William, is director of the Kansas Geological Survey and a KU professor. "He's a very understanding husband who encourages me and keeps up with a rather wild schedule," she says. Son Jeff, 20, is a KU student, and Ann, 22, attended KU for two years. The family has lived in the university city of 45,000 for 28 years. Nancy is a loyal Pi Phi and recently served as chairman of the alumnæ advisory committee for Kansas Alpha. She attended the Hot Springs Convention and returned to share many ideas with her club.

Mrs. Hambleton hopes to encourage more women to become active in city politics and calls them a great resource and one not fully utilized. In a newspaper interview following her election, she said, "Women are just as capable as men and I think it's time they should be encouraged to develop their talents. Women's rights is not the big problem right now. I think at this stage we need to encourage women to participate."

Her job includes many public appearances. She writes her own speeches because "no one else sounds like me."

As the governing body of a university town, the city commission has made an effort to get acquainted with students by inviting members of the Student Senate executive committee for a luncheon meeting and encouraging their suggestions.

"Youngsters have some ideas that are pretty good," says Nancy, "and I think they have the feeling that we're accessible. One thing, though, that they realize after coming to some of our meetings is that there are no simple solutions to all problems."

Unity Is Achieved In Greek Workshop

The second annual Greek Workshop for the Upper Midwest (GWUM) was held last November at the University of North Dakota. Approximately 100 delegates attended, representing fraternities and sororities from North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Montana, and Manitoba, Canada. The objectives stated for this workshop were to bring together Upper Midwestern Greeks so as to create an atmosphere of true communication and organization; to give each participant the opportunity to share in new ideas for application in his own organization; to stimulate internal unification; and to establish an atmosphere of awareness as to the role of Greeks on college campuses today.

In order to achieve these goals, the workshop was divided into nine small group discussions with time allocations allowing each delegate to attend six of the nine. Two leaders from UND were assigned to each topic to keep the discussions in motion.

The culmination of the workshop was on Sunday when resolutions were reached and South Dakota State University was chosen as

Mary was graduated from Iowa State University in home economics, with a minor in journalism. Her activities center around these facts.

She's been an editorial assistant for Women's Home Companion magazine, taught home economics at Iowa State, supervised a consumer action program for the District of Columbia community action agency, and later was director for a nationwide program to upgrade the image of household employees, based in Washington, D.C. While in the Nation's capitol, she also edited a national newsletter for homemaking for the American Home Economics Association.

Mary became involved in cooperative preschools while in Washington, D.C. During her husband's assignment on the Warm Springs reservation in Oregon she was chairman of the organizing committee for the first cooperative preschool on an Indian reservation. That successful kindergarten is now a Head Start school.

She is presently nutrition consultant for Head Start programs in the state of Washington, and was for three years general consultant for the Yakima Follow-Through program. She has designed a five-unit learning package for teaching the concepts of nutrition education to preschool children of the state. Planned Parenthood has just drafted her for its board.

For several years Mary was assistant editor of a weekly community newspaper, but now writes only features, many highlighting Indian



concerns. In the December issue of American Indian Crafts and Culture, published in Tulsa, Mary's article on Yakima costumes appeared. She also conducts writing workshops for staffers of the Yakima tribal newspaper.

Through her work with health care, family life and children, and newspaper publicity, Mary and her husband have come to know the Indian people, and have been accepted by them to the extent that they were made members of a Yakima family and given names, Anapashin' Mii and Now Tah Look, at last spring's root feast.

Mary's current project is the American Home Economics Association's Center for the Family, which is headquartered in Washington, D.C. As part of the Center's 18-member advisory council, she is one of five appointed from the American Home Economics Association membership. Among its major objectives is development of informational brochures dealing with current and proposed policies affecting the family. One of its first projects was compilation of a Fact Book on the American Family to be off the presses this summer.

"The exciting thing about the center," says Mary, "is that it's zeroing in on family units —how people live together—and what can be done to help the family nurture healthy, happy human beings."

This is what most of Mary's life has been about, and it pretty much sums up her attitude about her mission in the world. She has found a lot of "exciting" things that can be done to make the world a better place in which to live.

For the past 18 years, ten distinguished women have been selected each year by the St. Louis (Mo.) *Globe-Democrat* as Women of Achievement. The women are drawn from many walks of life, each following a tradition of service. Among those named as Women of Achievement for 1973 are Jane Baur Spoehrer and Harriet Baur Spoehrer, Missouri Beta sisters who married brothers.

For the past 30 years Jane Spoehrer has offered her time and talents to a myriad of civic activities, fund drives, and philanthropic efforts. One theme—the care of troubled children—predominates her activities, however, and for that reason she was selected a Woman of Achievement for Youth Dedication.

For many years the emotionally disturbed young women at the Girl's Home, a United Fund agency, have benefitted from her efforts as a member of the board of directors. Her work at the St. Louis Children's Hospital has brought her the most recognition, however.

Twenty years ago she answered a call for volunteers at the hospital, and she's worked on that basis ever since. For eight years she pushed a cart of light refreshments for the parents of the sick children. Twelve years ago the hospital opened a coffee shop with the volunteers serving as waitresses. Outgrowing that, the coffee shop became a cafeteria, and it's expanding again. Proceeds from the shop are donated to the hospital.

Three years ago Jane was elected president of the 900-member Children's Hospital Auxiliary and she has twice been re-elected to that position. In addition to patient care, fund raising has become an increasingly important job for the auxiliary. "The hospital's needs have grown and grown," Mrs. Spoehrer explained. "We have so much free care to give. We never turn a child down."

Harriet Baur Spoehrer shares the Woman of Achievement category of Youth Dedication with her sister. Her special community interest is also the St. Louis Children's Hospital, where her philanthropy made possible completion of the Hermann F. Spoehrer Children's Research Tower that was dedicated to her late husband's memory. She doesn't limit her contribution to financial gifts, however. She works at the information desk, as a regularly scheduled volunteer, and, on occasion, has served in the lunchroom, taking orders, carrying trays of food, and cleaning tables.

Although she worries about problems of crime and drugs, Harriet finds much good in America's young people and, as a naturally hopeful person, salutes the "majority who are good kids."

Harriet has been on the go much of her life but she praises her sister Jane as "the activist, who gets me involved." Those who know her consider her a genial friend, an unostentatious philanthropist and a hard-working volunteer. Her husband was a prominent St. Louis industrialist who served many years as president and board chairman of his favorite philanthropy, Junior Achievement. Both she and her husband subscribed to the philosophy that whatever they received was theirs to share.

Volunteer service is a tradition in the Spoehrer family, as it was in the Baur family. Jane and Harriet share the limelight for their dedication to young people.

"Okie" Earns State's Highest Honors

Frances Rosser Brown, Oklahoma Alpha, is the recipient of the two highest awards obtainable in the state of Oklahoma. Last May she was recognized by the University of Oklahoma when she was selected to receive the Distinguished Service Citation. This is the highest honor awarded by the University which does not give honorary degrees.

Mrs. Brown was inducted into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame during Oklahoma Heritage week last November.



These honors came in recognition of her "unselfish and unceasing efforts in behalf of her community and state."

In speaking of her, one friend said, "She is a modest, original, indomitable woman, semiinvalid for the greater part of her life, widely known both inside and outside of Oklahoma, who for the most part makes headlines for others.

"A volunteer publicist, she has helped to establish two hospitals in Muskogee and her stories have sparked all manner of community projects for which she has received recognition from her church, from the Elks, the Kiwanis and Sereptomist service clubs, and from Delta Kappa Gamma and the Da-ce-tah Indian Club, the latter three organizations awarding her honorary membership."

A concrete accomplishment has been the fulfillment of her dream that a museum be created which would motivate the gifted Indians of the Choctaw, Chickasaw, Cherokee, Creek, and Seminole Tribes. In the original Indian Agency Building, on Honor Heights overlooking the City of Muskogee, is now housed the heritage and hopes of those people in "The Five Civilized Tribes Museum."

On the day of the opening of the Museum, April 16, 1966, the famed wood sculptor, Willard Stone, presented his "Two Seasons" to the Museum in her honor.

The Jerome Tiger painting "The Trail of Tears," which hangs in the Museum, bears the inscription "Presented in honor of Frances Rosser Brown in recognition of her dedication to community causes including the restoration and opening of this Museum."

Besides the Distinguished Service Award for her role in establishing the Five Civilized Tribes Museum, Mrs. Brown holds a Certificate of Merit for her role in keeping the Thomas Gilcrease Institute of American History and Art in Oklahoma.

The Frances Rosser Brown Silver Pitcher Award is presented by Pi Beta Phi to honor the Fraternity's former national historian.

One observation has been made that this distinguished Pi Phi colors her exemplary life with wit as well as with dedication and wisdom. This trait was even recognized in her high school days. The year of her graduation from the Muskogee Central High School the following comment appeared under her name in the school annual yearbook:


> "When Minerva stomps her foot The bravest writhe and wriggle— But, Holy Mackerel—

Community Workshop Has Enrollment of Forty

For the first time in some years, but in keeping with the early Settlement School concept of serving the Gatlinburg area, a workshop for the community was started February 4, to run for 10 consecutive Monday evenings at Arrowmont.

Instructors for the course are two young graduate students in the Department of Crafts and Interior Design, College of Home Economics, at the University of Tennessee. Wayne Deveney, from Conover, N.C., received his B.F.A. degree from Western Carolina University and has received first place awards in weaving and textile design at the Annual Crafts and Interior Design Exhibition at the University of Tennessee. Ed Cook, of Racine, Wisc., has B.A. and M.S. degrees. He has received first place in textiles at Mount Mary College in Milwaukee in 1969 and first place in show at St. Francis College in 1967. Both young men expect to continue their study of textiles in Europe after graduation.

An enthusiastic group of forty women—and one man—are learning tie-dye, tie-bleach, batik, quilting, stitchery, applique, wrapping, twining, and looping. Students pay for their own materials and a minimal tuition charge. They work at their own pace; most are beginners, some are experienced craftsmen.

Among the students are the Arrowmont Administrator, the ex-Administrator, three Arrowmont office girls, and Faye Cook and Vicki Ownby from the Arrowcraft Shop.

Potters Market Thru Arrowcraft

Bill and Sue Ashley, natives of the Chattanooga area, have both turned to potting as a way of life and the Arrowcraft Shop in Gatlinburg is one of the marketers of their fine work.

Bill, after a tour of duty in the Marine Corps, graduated with a B.A. in Fine Arts from the University of Chattanooga in 1965. Following graduation he spent time working on a shrimp boat in the Florida Keys. Later he became a member of the Merchant Marines, shipping from the West Coast to Vietnam.

After returning to Chattanooga, he taught arts and crafts in the Hamilton County schools for five years, during which time he also coached football and wrestling. During the summers he taught at the Chattanooga Art Institute and studied pottery under Charles Counts, at his studio in Rising Fawn, Ga. In June, 1973, Bill left his teaching career behind in order to become a full time potter.

Sue graduated from the University of Chattanooga with a B.S. in elementary education in 1968. As a freshman she became a member of Pi Beta Phi and at various times served as music and program chairman in her chapter. Following graduation she taught second grade

for five years. During this time she continued study in the field of psychology at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, traveled in Europe, and studied pottery under Charles Counts.

Both Bill and Sue are now working full time from their home on Missionary Ridge, where they rent an older home and have converted an out-building into a studio. Their work is sold mainly through craft shops in the surrounding area and occasionally from their home studio. They enter a small number of craft shows but are known principally as producing craftsmen right now.

Both seem to feel that the satisfaction and independence gained from the potter's way of life make the long hours and hard work worthwhile. Their aim is to produce sound, functional pottery that others will enjoy using.

Sandy's Ceramics Earn Many Awards

Every Pi Phi, as well as the other individuals who have attended Arrowmont, knows and admires Sandra L. Blain, Assistant Director of Arrowmont from 1968 to present. Sandra is also Assistant Professor of Crafts and Interior Design in the College of Home Economics of the University of Tennessee. Prior to coming on the staff at Arrowmont, she was a student at Arrowmont for several months.

Sandra has received many awards for her pottery. This year at the Fifth Biennial Tennessee Arts and Crafts Association Exhibit in Memphis, Tenn., her ceramics were judged "Best In Show." Her listing of exhibitions is long and impressive, spanning a period from 1964 to present. In the past year she has had several one man shows.

"Just Pots" was the title of an exhibition by Sandra at the Drummer Gallery, Knoxville, Tenn. The exhibit included over 100 handbuilt pieces, each with a suggestion of the primitive. Subtle color combinations with glazed and unglazed surfaces and strong textural contrasts emphasized the seemingly ancient origin of the pieces. Pinch, coil, and slab methods of construction were used in creating the sculptural, but utilitarian, forms.

In speaking of her work, Sandra explains, "As a potter, I began using the wheel thrown technique of construction for almost all of my pieces, but I soon got tired of the overall sameness and general emphasis on technically proficient saleable items. My desire for simple, straightforward, earthy forms led me to the use of handbuilt construction techniques. I was thus able to manipulate the material in a free and spontaneous manner still realizing my ob-

jective of creating sculptural, but utilitarian, functional pots."

Another one man show, "Pots for Plants" by Sandra, was exhibited at Ridgeway Gallery, Oak Ridge, Tenn., April 20 to May 25, 1974. Some of her pottery is always on exhibit in the Exhibit Gallery at Arrowmont or in the display cases on the Pi Phi Mall.

Sandra has published an environmental multimedia slide series which is a work of art. This series is available on a rental basis from Arrowmont.

Her honors have been many, including: chairman of education committee, Southern Highland Handicraft Guild, 1973-74; president, East Tennessee Craft Guild, 1972-75; Tennessee representative to American Craftsman's Council, 1971-72-73-74; Crafts Advisory Panel, Tennessee Arts Commission 1972-73-74.

Pi Phi is indeed fortunate to have such a talented master craftsman as assistant director of Arrowmont. Such perfect teamwork—talent between Director Marian G. Heard and Assistant Director Sandra L. Blain would be difficult to duplicate.

SCAN Offers Help To Abusive Parents

SCAN, Suspected Child Abuse and Neglect, is a non-profit organization to help abusive mothers and fathers learn constructive child rearing. SCAN in Arkansas is directed by Sharon Raney Pallone, Virginia Alpha and Arkansas Alpha, and has been in operation since August, 1972. It is one of two such organizations in the nation to offer help to parents who have a child abuse problem.

The workers of SCAN are concerned citizens, all volunteers and mostly mothers, who have compassion for distressed families. Following a thorough training program taught by professionals, these workers are designated lay therapists who usually serve two cases annually, make regular family visits, and stand by on 24 hour emergency call. Presently, there are 54 SCAN workers in Little Rock, North Little Rock, Pine Bluff, Hot Springs, Fayetteville, and Russellville.

Most SCAN workers are college graduates, with some having masters degrees. Their purpose is to provide support to abusive parents in a non-critical way, to "mother the mother so she can mother her child," and to encourage her to seek community service that can help relieve family stresses.

Sharon has served as co-chairman of the Little Rock Literary Council and has served as state chairman. She is a member of the Arkansas Council for Child Protection, a guest member of the University of Arkansas Medical Center Child Protection Committee, and is on the SCAN Board. Recently she was designated a special investigator for the prosecuting attorney's office.

Sharon, herself, stands by on emergency call and has been known to respond to a call from the Little Rock jail at midnight on Saturday night. She also speaks at churches, civic, and service organizations, by invitation, to cultivate interest in the community and state about child abuse.

Sharon is married to Sam A. Pallone and has two sons, Pete, 6, and Mike, 4. She is a for-

mer professional tennis player and consistent winner in national golf tournaments. At present scuba diving is her greatest interest when she "can find the time."

Sharon was initiated at Virginia Alpha, Randolph-Macon, in 1958. After transferring to the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville, she served as president of Arkansas Alpha for two years. She was a recipient of the Amy Burnham Onken chapter award and is listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. Following graduation she became a graduate counselor for Pi Phi at Mississippi Southern where she did graduate work in psychology. Sharon also took part in the installation of Arkansas Beta in 1963. She is a member of the Little Rock Alumnæ Club.

"I am convinced that the cyclic problem of child abuse can be arrested if we who have experienced adequate parenting will reach out to abusive parents in a nonjudgmental, compassionate, and firm manner. This type of treatment is extremely effective when the SCAN worker is willing to devote at least twenty hours a week with a family. I base my opinion on statistics—SCAN provided services to over 300 families with a child abuse problem in one year. We have seen NO re-occurrences of abuse in any of these families," Sharon said.

Greeks Denounced; React To Criticism

Recently the Greek system was subject to large scale criticism at St. Lawrence University. While reviewing its own aims, the university questioned the value of fraternities and sororities on campus. The administration and faculty publicly denounced the Greek system as promoting an "anti-intellectual" atmosphere which had no place in a university setting. Articles in the school paper posed a direct challenge to all St. Lawrence fraternities and sororities to prove them wrong.

In response, the New York Gamma chapter of Pi Beta Phi organized a student-faculty afternoon in an attempt to bridge the communication gap. Professors and families were invited to spend an afternoon sampling the culinary treats of the sisters and their colleagues. Tours of the house were given to those who had never once set foot in a sorority house.

The initial uneasiness was soon replaced by flowing conversation and a free exchange of ideas. In the process, the individual who had most vehemently criticized the Greek system admitted that his purpose in doing so was to prompt us into action. He felt that as a closely knit, united group, sororities and fraternities had an excellent base for achieving ends which require group cooperation. He believed in the intrinsic dynamic force of a Greek organization which he had yet to see being used to its fullest. Granted, being in a sorority does enhance social skills and perhaps teaches some individual responsibility. But he felt that it could become much too easy to lose sight of our responsibilities, not only to our sisters but to those of the campus and community as well. He felt the Greek system at S.L.U. had degenerated to a strictly social organization and he hoped to see some proof of change.

Perhaps the slap in the face was what we needed at St. Lawrence. It forced us out of our complacency, and challenged us to reevaluate our aims and directives. The outcome was, in our opinion, quite healthy. It encouraged the soul-searching and thought which aided each sister in redefining her role as a sorority woman. **OPERATION BRASS TACKS**

Runner Holds World Marathon Record

"A little old lady in tennis shoes" might describe Ruth Purney Anderson, Nebraska Beta, except for the fact that she's far from being a little old lady, and her tennis shoes are track shoes instead! Ruth, a resident of Oakland, Calif., broke her own world record for masters women marathon runners last February 10, when she ran the 26 mile 385 yard course in three hours, 20 minutes!

Ruth is on the staff of the Lawrence Radiation Lab in Livermore, Calif., dealing with radio-active isotopes. Her husband, John, a veterinarian, says it was Ruth's custom to go to the large swimming pool at the lab during her noon hour. One day she found the pool closed for repairs, so she joined some of her friends in a bit of a jog around the area. She enjoyed it, but what she really liked was the fun of doing this with her friends, since she went home pretty stiff. As time went on, she and her associates ventured out farther until she was running about six miles daily.

"The running became easier," says John, "but there were some rather strange changes taking place. She was beginning to feel much better, alive! She lost about 20 pounds . . . and I found a new girl. I am almost a nut on the topic of how our family, including myself and our daughter, Rachel, have enjoyed this exercise together."

Ruth entered several races last year before she and two teammates from the Lawrence Lab team went to Phoenix last December where she first broke the world's record for women over 40, in spite of the fact that she pulled a tendon in her foot four miles from the finish line. It was in Phoenix during the Fiesta Bowl football game that Ruth had a second memorable moment. She was introduced to and cheered by a crowd of nearly 70,000. In winning this marathon, Ruth received a trophy, T-shirt, plaque, and tickets to the Fiesta Bowl.

"Victory, or even entry, in the Phoenix Marathon would not have been possible without Cathy Switzer," said Ruth. "Switzer broke the AAU's ban on women in marathons with her militant entry into the Boston Marathon a few years ago."

The February marathon in San Mateo, Calif., was a national race and Ruth bettered her own world's record time by about 5 minutes.

Ruth was born in Omaha, Nebr., just 44



years ago. Her mother was a Nebraska Beta Pi Phi and her aunt was a California Beta Pi Phi.

She has been running just a little over a year, and is self-coached.

Her husband John says, "Ruth fell upon a sport that she enjoys and is healthful and that she excels in. It so happens that Rachel and I enjoy it too, and we don't mind leading the cheering when the nature of the race is beyond our ability. I am awfully proud of my Ruth!"

Serves On Two National Commissions

Whether she's lecturing on vocational education, attending Oklahoma Beta House Corporation meetings, presiding over a meeting of the United Presbyterian Women's Association, or dashing off to Washington to meet with the National Advisory Council on Vocational Education, it's a sure bet that Caroline Erickson Hughes is busy with some type of civic activity.



Caroline's Pi Phi activities have been no less important than the rest. At the Hot Springs Convention she completed a two-year term as chairman of the national committee on amendments. She is a past province president of Nu Province and Omicron Province. She is a former member of the national committee on standards. Currently she serves as chairman of the Scholarship Foundation of Oklahoma Beta, in addition to her house corporation duties.

Caroline makes her home in Cushing, Okla., where her husband, Hugh, owns a lumber yard. Her interest in education goes back to college days when she earned her bachelor of science degree in home economics education. She taught for three years in Cushing High School and then, in 1960, she was the first woman to serve on the local board of education, holding the position for five years, and serving as president in 1963.

The Oklahoma State Advisory Council for Vocational Education was formed in 1969. Caroline was appointed to that committee by Gov. Dewey Bartlet, and reappointed by Gov. David Hall, and she was chairman and administrator for the first two years. In 1971, she was appointed by President Nixon to the National Advisory Council on Vocational Education, and she is currently serving on that committee. The purpose of these two councils is the evaluation of vocational education. The National Council reports to the Commissioner of Education for transmittal to the President and the Congress. Caroline's particular interest and involvements have been in the area of counseling and guidance, developing interaction of business/industry/education, and chairman of the sub-committee on American Indian Education.

In 1971 Mrs. Hughes was appointed by the U.S. Attorney General as the educational representative to the National Advisory Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals. She was the only layperson on the committee whose purpose was the development of standards and goals in the criminal justice system, applicable at state and local levels. Task Force reports on police, corrections, courts, and community crime prevention, and commission reports are now being implemented.

Caroline is listed in Who's Who in American Women, and Who's Who in the South and Southwest. She has received the Merit Award for Outstanding Service from the National FFA, and is an honorary member of the Oklahoma Association, Distributive Education Clubs of America. She's active in PTA, the Chamber of Commerce, Federated Women's Club, DAR, and her church, where she was the first woman to be elected elder to the local session.

Houston Stages Creative Workshop

On March 6 and 7 the Houston Alumnæ Club sponsored a Creative Workshop at the Contemporary Arts Museum. Because of our ties with Arrowmont and our desire to spread knowledge of handcrafts in our community (last year we produced a Folk Art Workshop), we chose this format of a Creative Workshop. Ninety women attended classes taught by four outstanding Houston craft instructors, all of whom have been frequent winners in designer arts and crafts shows.

Participants chose to take one of the following courses for the two-day sessions: needleweaving, cardweaving (both off-loom weaving techniques), macrame, or batik. At the conclusion of the workshops most students had completed a creative piece of work. Instructors included Ann Mitchell, Alice Merz, Mary Ruth Smith, assisted by Pi Phi Margaret Borders Ryan, and Phyllis Tucker, assisted by Mary Jean Stoddard Fowler, current member of the Board of Governors of Arrowmont.

Of special significance to Pi Phi is the fact that two of the four instructors involved in the workshops were former students at Arrowmont. Mary Ruth Smith, now a University of Houston instructor in weaving and design, studied at Arrowmont while receiving her degree from the University of Tennessee. Mary Ruth's first teaching assignment following graduation was at the Pi Beta Phi Elementary School in Gatlinburg. She plans to return to the University of Tennessee next fall to work on her doctorate. Ann Mitchell was one of the Houston Alumnæ Club's scholarship recipients to Arrowmont in 1973. Ann has trained extensively in the fiber art field and is accomplished in stitchery, braiding, and weaving.

Co-chairmen Ann Denker Webster and Susan Ray Dunlap worked many months to organize and stage the workshop. Supplies had to be assembled, cardboard looms constructed, and instruction sheets printed; color coordinated sack and box lunches were prepared both days by Houston Pi Phis.

Proceeds from the show benefitted the club's Scholarships to Arrowmont program and the Contemporary Arts Museum's Art after School program, providing tuition free art classes to areas of Houston where students are unable to pay. In addition to this special workshop, Houston Pi Phis operate and staff on a Monday through Saturday basis our Pi Beta Phi Craft Shop. Featured in the shop are items from Arrowcraft, articles made by talented Pi Phis, and items placed on consignment. Profits from this continuous project benefit both Arrowcraft and Arrowmont.

Houston Pi Phis agree that the enthusiasm of our four outstanding craftsmen and their students combined with the exciting background of the Contemporary Arts Museum proved that there is a need for such creative workshops in our community and that Pi Beta Phi can provide the leadership to make it a success. We will be glad to help any club desiring to try a similar project in their own community.

"We're Pi Phis Too," Say Canadians

In the spring ARROW of 1971, Alberta Alpha wrote an article pleading for closer contact with Canadian chapters. Now, in 1974, Nova Scotia Alpha would like to renew this request.

While at the Hot Springs Convention, our president discovered that there were several girls who had no idea that there were Canadian chapters, let alone knowing where Nova Scotia is. Contrary to popular belief, Nova Scotia is not a fishing village on the Arctic Circle, nor do we have snow all year round. Our winters are quite warm and we have very little snow, while our summers average about 70-80 degrees.

These misconceptions and this lack of knowledge cause us to feel a bit detached. Distance adds to the feeling. Our closest sister chapter is at the University of Maine, approximately 500 miles away, while our closest Canadian chapter is 1,183 miles. It is small wonder that Canadian chapters have trouble relating to Pi Beta Phi as an international organization. It is our hope to correct this situation by explaining our feelings and giving U.S. chapters some understanding of us.

Nova Scotia Alpha is a small chapter, with only fourteen members. The reason for this can be attributed to the fact that Dalhousie is mainly a commuter university. This means that most female students have already developed

The Fayetteville (Ark.) Alumnæ Club has officially changed its name to Fayetteville-Mary Campbell Gregory Alumnæ Club to honor Arkansas Alpha's first lady.

For three years Mary Campbell worked to gain a Pi Beta Phi charter at the University of Arkansas. She was the first initiate December 29, 1909, and the first chapter president of Arkansas Alpha. In February, 1910, she



was invited to aid in the installation of Oklahoma Alpha at the University of Oklahoma.

Living in other cities with her husband, James, Mary was active in alumnæ club activities. Elected to the presidency of the Kansas City Alumnæ Club in 1917, she helped to increase the membership from 8 to 125. Moving to Los Angeles, she accepted the position of vice president of the Los Angeles Alumnæ Club in 1924.

Returning to Arkansas in 1928, Mary resumed her service to Arkansas Alpha, which has continued without interruption to the present time. She has served continuously as the chapter's financial advisor and she has been treasurer of the Arkansas Alpha House Corporation since its organization. She, aided by her husband's knowledge of building, played a key role in the construction of the chapter's handsome present day home in 1956, now completely free of debt.

Mary Campbell Gregory was chairman of the national Endowment Fund Committee and has attended nine national conventions, as well as the installations of both Arkansas Beta and Tennessee Delta chapters. She has been active in the local alumnæ club and was instrumental in starting the Fayetteville Mothers' Club.

Each year at the Founders' Day banquet "A Tribute to Loyalty" is read and a Mary Campbell Gregory Service Award is given to the Pi Phi, "be she an alumna or active member who has strived and excelled in exemplifying the same spirit and loyalty of Arkansas Alpha's first lady."

The tribute concludes, "Although the Fraternity owes its beginning . . . to the Founders, its development through the years is due to the devotion and loyalty of its members. To us, this particular member's devotion is a joy, a blessing and an inspiration. . . . This woman is to us the epitome of fraternity and fellowship. This woman symbolizes the very ideals for which we stand."

Now retired, Mary's activities have been curtailed for health reasons, but she continues her love and affection for "her girls" of Arkansas Alpha and all Pi Phis everywhere.



In 1966 she served as chairwoman of a massive cancer-prevention program directed to the Spanish-speaking citizenry of Tucson. She was president of the Pima County Medical Auxiliary and currently serves as a director.

Recognition of the unique cultural blendings in Tucson, situated near the Mexican border, stimulated in Mary a desire to preserve its special qualities and to foster intercultural understanding and cooperation. by JUDITH PLANTING Tucson A.C.

Una Noche Plateada (One Silvery Night) was the child of this interest. Originally conceived as an annual ball to benefit the Cancer Society and to bring together the various ethnic groups of Tucson in a common effort, UNP has since grown into an independent organization benefitting its own charities. Mary was first chairwoman of the ball and first president of the organization, which has to date contributed over \$60,000 to various charities.

Mary's community activities stretch out to encompass arts, music, history, education, and medicine. With others, Mary founded Los Tucsonenses to present Hispanic cultural works to the community. She organized the Historic Tucson Committee to involve citizens in preserving historic sites and the heritage of Tucson. She was subsequently named to the first Tucson Historical Committee. She is current president of the Cultural Exchange Council, which she founded in 1972 to develop exchanges between Tucson and Old Mexico in hopes of increasing the appreciation of each for its neighbor. To this end, she served as chairwoman of "Fandango in Old Town," a fund-raising benefit for the council.

In 1971, Mary organized Project Unity for persons of all racial, religious, and ethnic backgrounds. It aims toward eradicating discrimination and opening communication between these groups.

With activities and accomplishments almost too numerous to list, Mary Lucas Acosta may seem like a Super Pi Phi to some of us living at a slower pace. With all, she has not been too busy to stay close to Pi Beta Phi, contributing to the alumnæ advisory board in Tucson and continuing to open her house and heart to various Fraternity and alumnæ activities.

West Virginia Alpha, as well as other Greeks and the university Panhellenic Council, will feel the loss of a sister and an outstanding worker because Paige Cornwell was graduated this spring.

Paige became a member of Pan during her second semester as a sophomore. The second meeting she was elected assistant rush chairman and the following year, was elected head



rush chairman. Since she became a member of Pan, she has initiated so many new programs and ideas that the Greek system as a whole benefited.

One of the most important programs she initiated was the rush counselors program which provides that every rushee has a personal rush counselor. The first time this program was put into effect, the rate of rushee drops decreased almost 50%, and for the first time in WVU history, every rushee who signed a bid slip pledged a sorority. The counselor system also initiated friendships between rushees and counselors which lasted long after rush was over. Paige was responsible for starting a Greek get-together before rush. She began with her own sorority. Pi Phis sent out invitations to all other sororities inviting them to a brunch the day before rush began. It was so successful that there was 100% participation. Now Pan has taken over the idea and sponsors the get-togethers to keep the Greek spirits high.

Other ideas which Paige initiated include the establishment of a quota system by which every rushee can be placed in a house. The idea of helping girls move into the dorms at the beginning of the fall term became effective. Paige herself edited a new rush booklet. It was her idea to allow houses to go to a more individual type party planning and execution. Informal rush was started, allowing rushees to dress more casually than before.

Exchange dinners between Greek houses were experimented with in the past year and Pan has sponsored fraternity and sorotity pledge get-togethers. Pan now tries to send two girls from each house to the National Panhellenic Convention. Greek Week was changed so that it is now of value to the entire campus as well as to the Greeks. The system by which Pan rotated the presidency from house to house was changed so that each sorority now has a fair chance to field the best girl for the job. And through Paige's work, Pan meetings are held at the various sorority houses so that the members can get to know each other on a more personal basis.

It's a safe bet that Paige Cornwell's influence will be felt on the West Virginia University campus for many years to come.

The Pi Phis of Tennessee Beta upheld their reputation as campus leaders of school spirit last fall when junior Kari Peterson was crowned the 1973 Homecoming Queen. Accompanying her on the court was another of our juniors, Emily Martin. 
Executive Receives Appointment






