Miss Wattles lives in Troy, Mich., on five acres of the original homestead that has been her home since birth. She was active in civic groups until age 98, according to her 83-year-old brother, Morris. She bought a new car at the age of 90 and was still driving at 95. Now, however, after several falls, Miss Wattles is bedridden. She is a retired Detroit school teacher where she taught math for 47 years.

Miss Wattles is a member of the Bloomfield Hills Alumnae Club, and to the many congratulations she has received, we would like to add our own, even though belated—Happy Birthday, Miss Helen!

A third, equally outstanding, has been chosen to guide our newest chapter. Assuming this demanding position will be Susanna Baker, Louisiana Beta, Resident Graduate Counselor for Texas Zeta.

Becky Rhoten

Becky was charter treasurer of the Kentucky Gamma chapter, and, after transferring to Florida Beta, became treasurer of that chapter. As treasurer of both chapters she was conscious of the needs and problems of her sisters, as well as the fiscal needs and budget complications of the chapters.

When Becky affiliated with Florida Beta, she never stopped giving her all. As one alumna who recommended Becky noted, "She participated in all functions and became a true sister to every Florida Beta Pi Phi."

Becky holds a degree in Recreation and Social Work, with future plans including a desire for a masters in Social Work.

In applying for a graduate counselor position, Becky wrote, "Being a member of Pi Beta Phi has been one of the most exciting phases of my college career and has provided the opportunity for me to grow mentally and

spiritually, to develop strengths that would have been fragmented outside a fraternal system. As a graduate counselor it would be my hope to be able to infuse each visited chapter with enthusiasm and determination to be the very best."

Barb Lacke's name should ring a bell with many members of the Fraternity, since she served on the Legislative Committee for the 1977 Convention in Minneapolis. She also won the award for the best original song at that Convention, with her lovely "And Here We Are."

Barb's degree is in Music Composition and she eventually hopes to end up in Los Angeles composing musical scores for educational TV and films. She is interested also in writing music for commercials or promotional sales films. In her chapter she was pledge class president and voted outstanding pledge. As a sophomore she was elected president of her chapter, and she has held many other in-chapter offices. On campus, she is the immediate past president of the Iowa State Panhellenic which won a top award at NPC last summer.

stronger than the one I've had the honor and privilege of sharing. I've worked for it, through it, with it, and now I'd like to share it."

Susanna Baker

Susanna goes to Texas Zeta at Baylor for a year as graduate counselor, guiding Pi Phi's newest chapter. She has a Bachelor's Degree in broadcasting journalism from L.S.U., and feels that one of the most important requirements for a graduate counselor is the ability to communicate effectively. As a future career woman, she recognizes the importance of communication in Pi Phi as well as in the business world, and that is why she majored in Speech.

Susanna is bright, personable, pretty, and enthusiastic. She served her chapter in many

capacities, including president. In the latter position she sparked everyone with her strong belief and love in the values of Pi Phi. A former Louisiana Beta president wrote about Susanna, "Being a graduate counselor calls for a very special person, and I believe Susanna is such a person. She is one of the finest examples of organization and congeniality with others—what a perfect combination!"

In applying for the position of Graduate Counselor, Susanna said, "I'm an x-President now . . . and I am at the height of my appreciation, enthusiasm, and dedication for Pi Phi. I've been spending a good part of every day for the last year on Pi Phi, and I love the idea of keeping it up, with the challenge of new settings and responsibilities."

Dr. Charlotte Kerr Heads AMWA

Charlotte Herman Kerr, M.D., Illinois Zeta, of Seminole, Fla., holds the position of president of the American Medical Women's Association (AMWA). Serving as president-elect in 1977, she was in charge of planning the scientific program for the annual meeting at Denver in December, at which time she was inducted as president.



Dr. Kerr received her B.S. degree, with honors, in 1940 at the University of Illinois, where she was president of the Home Economics Club, a member of Home Economics honoraries Phi Upsilon Omicron and Omicron Nu, president of Women's Athletic Associa-

tion, and tapped for Mortar Board. She received her M.S. in nutrition in 1944 from Iowa State University and her M.D. degree in 1948 from the University of Illinois College of Medicine.

Dr. Kerr was a pioneer among women appointed to internships, her first appointment being from 1948-1950 at Cook County Hospital, Chicago. Then followed general practice at Danville, Ill., and residencies in a number of Chicago area hospitals.

Dr. Kerr has authored and collaborated on many papers in medical journals and textbooks. Since 1973 she has served on the panel for obstetrical and gynecologic devices of the National Food and Drug Administration.

Since 1974 Dr. Kerr has been attending physician in gynecology, Lake Seminole Hospital, Seminole, Fla., and GYN consultant at Veterans Administration Hospital, Bay Pines, Fla. Since 1976 she has been associate attending physician and surgeon at University General Hospital, Seminole.

In addition to her national services and her medical and surgical practice in Seminole hospitals, Dr. Charlotte, Gynecologist, and her husband, Dr. John E. Kerr, Urologist, have their office for private practice in Seminole, where they have their home. A daughter, Patricia, is a recent college graduate.

The St. Petersburg Alumnae Club is honored to have Dr. Kerr as a member.

Ph.D. Candidates Earn Fellowships

In 1909, Grand Council established a Graduate Fellowship of \$500 available to any Pi Beta Phi who had received her bachelor's degree. By 1925 an Endowment Fund had been raised, and this fund, now totaling \$20,000, is the Pi Beta Phi Fellowship fund, the interest of which provides annually the Pi Beta Phi Fellowship.

This year, two \$1,000.00 Fellowships have been awarded. Candace Williamson, Alabama Gamma, and Leigh Leslie, Texas Gamma, are the recipients.

Candy Williamson

Candy will complete her doctorate in horticulture at Mississippi State in May 1979. After graduation she hopes to receive a "split" appointment as a professor of horticulture (half teaching and half extension). She also plans to continue with her horticulture writing. A number of her articles have appeared in professional journals. She has taught gardening courses for several organizations, the latest being Foster Botanic Gardens in Honolulu. She plans to keep teaching these off-campus courses as well as fulfilling speaking engagements.

Private research interests Candy, and one project in particular holds her attention. At the request of Kappa Kappa Gamma friends, and with the consent of Kappa's Grand Council, Candy is breeding their official sorority flower—an iris with light blue standards and

Candy holds a quarter-time assistantship at Mississippi State that will pay most living expenses. However, she will be required to do some traveling throughout the state in order to complete her dissertation on the development of a horticulture training program for high schools. 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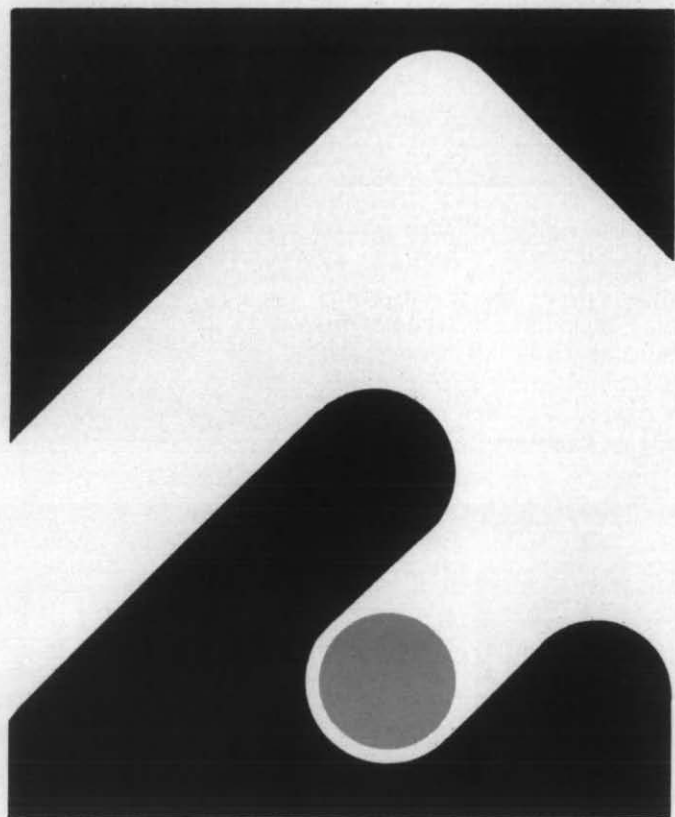

Utilizing the first letter of the school's name, the logo represents the nature of the Arrowmont Experience, which is the sharing of one's skills, one's philosophy; in other words, one's art.

Ray Pierotti, Arrowmont Director, states that it also represents the mountains about the school, the high place that learning and education hold in the philosophy and preferred giving of the Pi Phis. The circle in the arm of

the A represents the center of learning, the circle of the conference table, the gathering together of all peoples, regardless of race and creed.

The new logo is being used on letterheads, brochures, signs.

Bourke, currently instructor and Chairman of Communications and Humanities, St. Clair Community College, Port Huron, Mich., is on the staff of the 1978 Arrowmont summer session.

Arrowcraft Shop Opens Display Gallery

There was much excitement this spring at Arrowcraft Shop, Gatlinburg, with the opening of a new exhibition and sales gallery featuring the contemporary works of regional craftspeople.

The Arrowcraft Gallery opened March 25 with a multi-media exhibition of wood, pottery, weaving, jewelry, enamels, puppets, and fiber art.

Caroline Riddle, Administrator of Arrowmont and Arrowcraft, who established the gallery, has chosen Bette Raymond as its director. Bette, a member of the Southern Highland Handicraft Guild as a vegetable dyer, has taught spinning and dyeing at area workshops and recently has been manager of the Twelve Designer Craftsmen Shop, Pigeon Forge, Tenn.



Weaving Family Spans Generations

Weaving can become a family affair that often spans several generations. It's true particularly in the Wilson family which has had four generations of weavers supplying items for Arrowcraft Shop customers.

Ruth Wilson, a 30-year weaver, was preceded by her mother who wove until she was 82 years old. Ruth learned from her brother and sister-in-law.

Ruth's daughters, Ruby Whaley and Sue Ogle, add another generation to the weaving clan, and a still younger age group is represented by Connie Cole, Ruby Whaley's daughter, and Tim Wilson, a nephew of Ruby and Sue.

For many of the weavers their salary is their livelihood, used to maintain their homes. Each weaver has her own unique skills and specializes in weaving particular products. Some prefer the patterned design while others like the simple design.

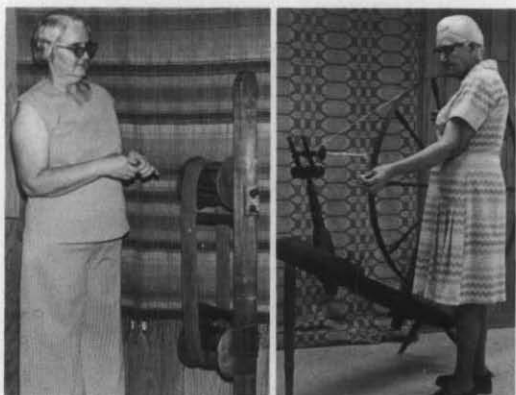
Weavers own their own looms, but the shop assists them in purchasing if needed. They are issued yarn at Arrowcraft and given a pattern to take home to begin weaving in quantity, but always knowing that quality is the most important because of Arrowcraft's high standard in hand weaving.

It takes about six to 12 hours to put the warp on the loom before beginning to weave; usually 80 to 100 yards of warp are put on the loom at once. It is threaded into the loom according to the design to be woven. After several pieces are woven, the weaver can take them off the loom; they are then ready to sew and press before bringing to Arrowcraft.

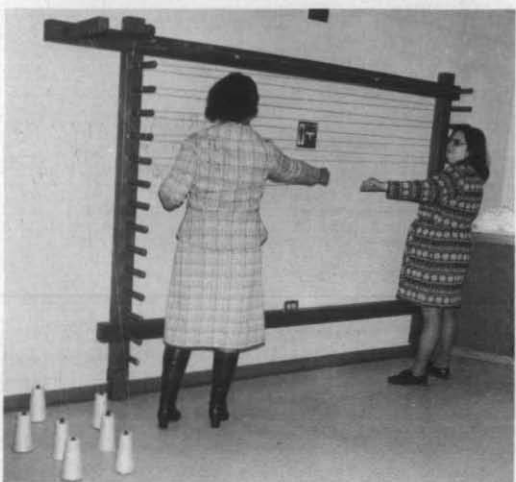


Connie Cole obtains yarn from weaving assistant Cathy Graves. Connie weaves Westwind mats, using 100 yards of warp at a time.

Quilt Is Winner In Magazine Contest

Congratulations to Administrator Caroline Riddle whose beautiful quilted montage depicting Settlement School and the Appalachian crafts was one of 51 winners in a recent Good Housekeeping Great Quilt Contest!

A full-page color picture of her detailed quilt and directions for making a similar quilt or wall hanging appeared in the March 1978 issue of Good Housekeeping magazine.

The contest, which drew 9,954 entries, was sponsored by Good Housekeeping, the U. S. Historical Society and the Museum of American Folk Art. Winners represented each state and the District of Columbia. Caroline's entry was the Tennessee winner.

Many may remember seeing Caroline's quilted montage on display at the Pi Phi convention in Minneapolis, Minn., where it drew much favorable comment.

One block represents Arrowmont showing Red Barn, Staff House, Arrowmont School, Arrowcraft Shop, cottages, Little Pigeon River, and the Great Smoky Mountains.

Other blocks include a Whig Rose mat woven by Arrowcraft weavers, a braided rug made from her own vegetable dyed wools, and a corn husk doll. There are several pieces made by Nurse Marjorie Chalmers as a gift to Caroline. Also, there is a woven piece by Tina McMorran, an Arrowcraft weaving designer for many years; a square showing a Great Smoky Mountain bear sewn by Helen Lewis, former Grand Council and BOGs member; and a square depicting an iron made by Lela Adams, former Settlement School housemother and now Staff House cook.

Pi Phis and others from across the country have written Caroline in recognition of the excellent design and the fine publicity.

New Business Is Result of Challenge

"Necessity is the mother of invention," so the saying goes. And Faye Cook and her sister, Veryl Monhollen, both Arrowcraft staff members, recognized a need when Arrowcraft's catalog listed a number of craft items for sale that the shop was unable to obtain from local craftsmen. Faye challenged Veryl's sons to provide the wooden items.

Veryl and her husband, Lee, have three talented and energetic sons—Roger, Randell, and Jeff. They also had a large building on their property that formerly had been a chicken house.

The building soon was converted into a woodworking shop; a business license was obtained, and a name chosen for the business. So, Middlecreek Crafts came into existence.

Lee and sons enrolled in a design class at Arrowmont taught by Mrs. Doris Bartels.

The four fledgling craftsmen started supplying Arrowcraft Shop with the items it needed most. Soon their line expanded to include napkin rings, cutting boards, wall brackets, and flower plaques.

Needless to say, the new business is flourishing, and the Monhollens' three sons found that they could no longer devote only evenings to their new avocation. They have left their other employment to spend full time at Middlecreek Crafts.

Loyalty to Arrowcraft Shop, which presented the opportunity that launched them into business, has prompted the new craftsmen to process its orders first. They also weave shoulder totes for Arrowcraft when needed.

To Compile Registry

A registry of Pi Phis who are practicing craftsmen is being compiled at Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts. The information will be made accessible to gallery owners, museum and educational program directors.

To be included, artists/craftsmen should send a resume (including Pi Phi chapter and

initiation date), two 35 mm slides of themselves at work, and up to five slides showing individual examples of their craft. The slides become the property of Arrowmont Board of Governors. Craftsmen are reminded not to submit the actual samples of their work.

First Lady Doll Wears Official Pin

On a recent tour of the Whitaker-Jaynes House, the oldest house in Buena Park, Calif., Elizabeth Felowisch Bateman and I were impressed with a special collection of papier mache dolls, replicas of the First Ladies, wearing their inaugural gowns. When we came to the replica doll of Grace Goodhue Coolidge, we noticed they had a tiny pin on her dress. We knew that her own Pi Beta Phi pin was on her gown in the Smithsonian Institute. To make her copied gown more authentic, we thought it would be nice to get an official pin. Wheels began to turn and we were soon granted permission to donate a pin. The curator of the House, Mrs. Erylene Adams, was as delighted as we. Since the doll is only 39 inches tall, we decided to use a recognition pin. Martha Earle Perry donated her pin which has a small pearl on the shaft.

When plans were completed, the Whittier Area Alumnae Club had a special tour of the house and made a formal presentation of the pin. The mayor of Buena Park was also in attendance. Highlights of the life of Grace Goodhue Coolidge were given. She was a Vermont Beta, an active alumna, and a Beta Province President.

In the late twenties, I had been told about the Pi Phi pin on Mrs. Coolidge's gown by

Terrific Tennis Team Triumphs

When Nina Cloninger, Rebecca Garcia, and Jean Scott graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1977, it looked as if both the Tar Heels and the Pi Phis might lose their grips on the best women tennis players in the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC).

Those three varsity tennis team Pi Phis teamed with Camey Timberlake of Lexington, N.C., to take a stronghold on Carolina tennis for the 1976-77 tennis season.

A good fall rush for N.C. Alpha added three more top-notch tennis players to the Pi Phi-Tar Heel ranks, however, making the squad one of the most promising ever. Led by Timberlake at the number two spot, freshmen Lloyd Hatcher at number three, Margaret Scott at fourth, and Betty Baugh Harrison, who alternates between fifth and sixth, helped Carolina cruise to ACC tennis championship last fall.

Timberlake, the first woman ever to get a full athletic scholarship at UNC, overcame shoulder and knee injuries to play at Carolina and had one of her healthiest and best seasons in 1977-78. She received a business administration degree in May and plans to keep playing tennis as long as possible.

"I'd like to play tennis for a while," she said. "I want to play tournaments this summer and, ideally, play the tournament next winter."

Hatcher, a Richmond, Va., native who now lives in Greenwich, Conn., and Harrison, of Richmond, played high school tennis together. They have been life-long friends, but say they didn't influence each other to come to Carolina or pledge Pi Phi.

"I wasn't even sure Betty was coming here until the end of last year," Hatcher said, "and I didn't know Betty and Margaret were going to pledge Pi Phi."

Hatcher's Pi Phi ties actually run very deep. Her grandmother, Mary Thomas Cox Hatcher, a Golden Arrow Pi Phi, was an active at Hollins College in Virginia over 50 years ago.

Margaret Scott of Wilmington, N.C., also has a Pi Phi legacy. She has followed in her sister Jean's footsteps, playing varsity tennis and pledging Pi Phi.

So though they didn't plan it this way, the

players have found that being in the same sorority has its advantages.

"You feel a lot closer," Timberlake said. "If you're on a team you're close anyway, but it just adds an extra bond."

"It's been great because we are all good friends so we have lots of fun playing tennis and traveling together as well as participating in sorority activities together," Hatcher said.

During the seasons (fall and spring) they practice about three hours a day, which takes the whole afternoon. Unless they have a match, they can usually make it over to the Pi Phi house for dinner before spending evenings catching up on the school work that has piled up on road trips which take them away from classes as many as three days in a row sometimes.

Days in Chapel Hill are usually hectic for the team members as they try to fit in practice, and studies, and sorority activities.

But, as Scott put it, "It takes a lot of time, but it's definitely worth it. I wouldn't give up tennis or Pi Phi."

Angels Ride Figi Rocket

Homecoming weekend at the University of Western Ontario created a unique project for the Ontario Betas. An invitation was extended by Phi Gamma Delta to join them in building a float for the annual homecoming parade. ECHOES ON ENGLISH: While we complain of the inability of students to handle the English language as well as they once did, listen to these echoes from the past offered by Josephine Speark, associate professor of Education at Indiana University. 1890: "In the complaints drawn up by colleges against high schools, it is the inability to write passably correct English that is most severely complained of." 1910: "It is the common complaint among businessmen that young people seeking employment are not well grounded in the fundamentals." 1917: "From every college in the country goes up the cry, 'Our freshmen can't spell, can't punctuate!'" 1965: "The English language is dying because it is not being taught."

HAIR DRYERS have been added to the men's gym at Missouri, an administrator commenting that the University had been unfair to men with long hair.

TAPE TYCOONS are appearing on campus—enterprising persons who pay as many as 100 students to take usable notes or tape class lectures which are reproduced for sale. On one campus lecture notes sell for \$18 a semester, verbatim notes, \$40, and notes plus tapes, \$125.

HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS were permitted to enroll in college credit courses at the University of Toledo during the city's public school financial crisis last fall, and the program was continued even when the public schools reopened.

QUALITY EDUCATION is the emphasis of a campaign launched by the University of Colorado student government, pointing also to the need for research support funds and efforts to keep tuition costs down. Fact sheets have

been circulated among students and appear on bulletin boards urging readers to write legislators expressing their desire for quality over quantity on the Boulder campus.

FOOD CONSERVATION is receiving the attention of the Coca Cola Company which has selected five schools (Yale, Stanford, Michigan State, South Carolina, Indiana) to compete to see which can waste the least food. An Indiana official comments that in serving 50,000 meals each day, an ounce of food left on a plate adds up to 1.5 tons of waste a day, nearly 8 tons a week.

TEXTILE ANALYSIS and general information on the selection and care of fabrics is offered by the faculty of Home Economics at the University of Alberta.

PART-TIME STUDENTS are still a large percentage of the educational population, especially at the graduate level. Total enrollment in graduate programs has remained steady though the number of applications for graduate school has decreased slightly, according to the Council of Graduate Schools.

VITICULTURE AND ENOLOGY are being studied by more than 150,000 students on 600 campuses—the study of grape cultivation and the study of wine respectively.

RENT-A-TEACHER is what they're calling the increase in part-time faculty, according to the *Chronical of Higher Education*. In four years, it states, the number of full-time faculty members on the nation's campuses has increased 4% while the number of part-time professors has leaped up by 38%.

MORE STATISTICS from the National Center for Education Statistics tell us that the per-

centage of students studying within their home states continues to increase, about 85% at the present time.

STUDENT UNIONS are alive and well and are examining their facilities and programs and revamping them to fit today's needs, according to a recent *Chronicle of Higher Education*. Union directors who feared for the future of the student center during the turbulence of the late '60s reflect their optimism today. Though tightened budgets have trimmed some of the traditional activities, the union has resumed its position as a hub of campus action and for the most part has shed its "ping-pong palace" image.

HISTORY is in a crisis! This is the way the Organization of American Historians describes the declining enrollments in college history courses. The limited number of jobs in the field—in a generation primarily interested in prospects after graduation, has no doubt had its effect on current history course enrollment. The OAH report also commented that students say they are bored with the subject while academicians are worried about the dilution of history in other social studies programs. . . . On the other hand, Duke University is reporting a fresh look at its own region's past as students take an enthusiastic part in Duke's oral history program. Tape recordings of song and story, interviews, recollections are becoming a new sort of record of days gone by.

COUNTING STUDENTS can be made to tell different stories, depending on your method of counting. A headcount, for instance, can report that 16,000 students are enrolled on a given campus. This includes all full or part-time students some of whom may be taking only one or two courses—especially if it is an urban campus with many evening classes. So, to determine full time enrollment (FTE), you divided 15 (or what is considered normal full-course load) into the total number of credit hours being taken. Sometimes this can translate the 16,000 to as little as 13,000 if many part-time students are on the roll, but in recent years so many students have carried heavy loads that the FTE occasionally exceeds the headcount.

PREVENTING CRIME continues to be a mat-

ter of concern on the campus. A three-projector slide show on crime prevention is a part of freshman orientation at Central Michigan University.

FOOD AND DIET also continues to receive much attention on most campuses—diet tables in dining centers, health food snacks in food machines, and so on. Georgia State University recently opened a Diet Counseling Clinic to serve not only students, staff, faculty, and alumni, but Atlanta area residents as well.

BETTER INFORMATION about the schools they might choose is the chief interest of college-bound students, according to a recent seven state survey. High on the list of information wanted was more detailed particulars regarding cost, when payments are due, how much is the projected cost from entrance to graduation, including possible raises in tuition. The College Entrance Examination Board has responded by offering a new volume called *Making It Count*.

PHONE ABUSE—making and accepting long distance calls on dormitory phones—cost the University of Maryland \$80,000 last semester. A series of repeated threats, warnings, and pleadings resulted in repayment of \$30,000 in toll charges. The office of resident life regarded the remaining deficit a serious enough matter to bring about the removal of 308 phones distributed throughout the dorm system. This move has raised the student-per-phone ratio to a point that is self-policing: strict student-imposed time limit on each call with others always in line waiting.

EDUCATION SAMPLING for prospective students who aren't sure about college or about particular courses is being encouraged by permit at Black Hawk College, Moline, Illinois. Ten dollars buys a permit which allows the prospective student to sit in on up to six sessions of a course (except labs, studio courses, or any class having an exam), to attend college events, to use the library and audio-visual equipment in the college's independent learning center.

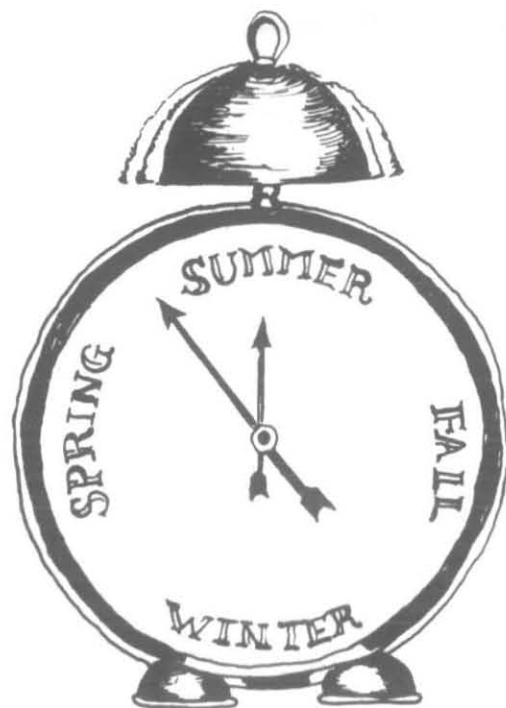
