

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

Chapters occupy new homes at Texas A&M, Central Florida

The first two chapter houses to be built and owned by Pi Beta Phi Fraternity House Corporations in many years are now completed and occupied. Members of Florida Epsilon at the University of Central Florida and Texas Eta at Texas A & M are thrilled to be living in their new houses, having moved in last fall.

Texas Eta

On August 15, 50 excited Texas Etas braved the the 100° heat as they became the first residents of their brand new home. After three years of waiting, the day was finally here! Walls still needed paint, the floor wasn't down in the dining room and the workmen were about to become members of the family as the chapter settled in for their first rush in the house.

The girls weren't even sure they were going to have mattresses that night. Those mattresses finally arrived at 7:30 p.m., after the whole chapter had left for initiation. Alumnae and their husbands carried all 48 in-and up!

Though that day will be remembered by all concerned, it was only the beginning of an eventful year. From August to November, Jose, the foreman, and his workmen were always there. Pi Phis came to enjoy the odor of fresh paint and the early morning hammering—even at 7:00 a.m. on Saturdays. Showers often were postponed as the familiar phrase "MAN ON FLOOR!" echoed down the halls.

The 50 in-house girls have done a lot of sharing in this past year. As a result, many new friends have been made as they endured the trials, tribulations and fun that comes with being the first residents.

The house is beautiful and has an unique feature that has made it the talk of campus. It is the only one with a porte-cochere—otherwise known as the Pi Phi drive-through. The popular saying is "Two Pi Phis to go." It has been great in the rain and for quick departures and is popular with dates.

The house contains 15,000 square feet and includes sleeping space for 50. It is a two story with bedrooms, baths and chapter room on the second floor. In the bedroom area, there are four three-girl rooms and eighteen two-girl rooms. There is a lounge/TV area upstairs as well. The first floor has the living and dining rooms, entry, guest room, library, TV room, house director's apartment, office and commercial kitchen. It is a \$1,000,000 project.

Called "The Miracle on the Brazos" by the many alumnae who were involved in its construction, much love, energy, foot miles and talent went into the finished project.

"We spent 3½ years in our Lodge, a split level meeting room in a strip shopping center, so we have come a long, long way in four years," says Sally Hammond Daniel, Indiana Delta, a member of the House Corporation Board. "I cannot stress

enough the hours of love and effort, new friendships and shared talents that have gone into our 'Miracle.' Stop a minute, though, and realize this is Pi Beta Phi-the bonds of wine and blue spread abroad."

Florida Epsilon

After seven years of planning and preparation, Florida Epsilon and the Orlando/Winter Park Alumnae Club officially dedicated the new chapter house in a special ceremony held on Sunday, December 4, at the University of Central Florida.

Approximately 300 guests attended the two-part dedication ceremony which began with the official dedication of the house from the alumnae club to the chapter. Heidi Lancaster Strunk, a former Florida Epsilon chapter president, presented the house to current president, Stacy Skinner, who received it on behalf of the chapter. House Corporation cochairman, Helen Larzelere Whittle, told of the excitement and hard work that went into building the house. Co-chairman Eleanor Yothers Fisher presented plaques recognizing the many Pi Phi angels and friends who contributed significantly to the \$100,000 in funds raised by alumnae club. Architect Richard Awsomb and

builder Allan Trovillion were recognized for their outstanding commitment to designing and building the house.

Special recognition was given to Warren Pearce, who designed, crafted and donated a six foot by three foot half-circle stained glass window that is the focus of the house's elegant entry. The window is dedicated in honor of his daughter, Jennifer, Florida Epsilon alumna and former rush chairman. The window depicts the Greek letters Π B Φ , encompassed by long wine and blue hearts pierced by a golden arrow.

Following the ceremony, University officials, members of the com-

munity and representatives from other Greek organizations attended an open house. Guests were given guided tours of the living quarters. A reception followed.

Although Florida Epsilons moved in in August, it was too late for rush, held prior to the opening of school. Perhaps it was just as well, because memories of "those little things that go wrong," can now be seen from a distance and laughed about.

There was the time the sophisticated computerized air conditioning managed to freeze girls in one side of the house, while letting those on the other side swelter in the Florida heat. So much for sophistication. Now the house has regular air conditioning!

As the girls were moving in and storing items in their closets, all the closet shelves fell down.

And, depending on a cook who apparently was accustomed to feeding a larger number, the chapter sat down to one of their first meals in the house. The delicious looking pasta salad had so much pepper in it that the girls couldn't eat it. What to do? Give it to the Lambda Chis! The men loved it!

The 9200-square foot, \$585,000 house is decorated in mint green and peach and features an expansive great room and dining area with a cathedral ceiling and an elegant fireplace. A fully operational kitchen serves breakfast and dinner to house residents. The ten furnished three-girl bedrooms include built-in study areas. A house director's suite provides a private living room, bedroom, bath and entry. The house, designed for eventual expansion to a second story, makes Florida Epsilon the fourth member of the University of Central Florida's Greek Park.

Furnishing this lovely Pi Phi home is still in progress. As a Pi Phi husband said, "Out of all the houses on Greek row, we have the greatest entertainment room of all—but no furniture!"

But that, too, will come about, thanks to loyal Pi Phi alumnae who have been working for many years to provide a home away from home for Florida Epsilon.

Artist earns critics' acclaim

Pi Phi alumnae of New Orleans, as well as those in the art enclaves of that Crescent City, are beaming over the recent honor of their own Sharon Nelson Weilbaecher, Colorado Alpha, whose painting was selected for the cover of the prestigious *American Artist* magazine, January 1989. Her work is also featured in the cover story, "Ten Artists Respond to a Southern Plantation."

Sharon, whose artistic credits are many, received an honor from the magazine in 1987 also when her painting, "Amazing Grace" was selected for its Golden Anniversary traveling exhibit, shown at outstanding museums across the country. It was one of 78 paintings chosen from 13,000 entries.

Sharon's training was as a medical illustrator and she spent 12 years in that profession after earning her master's degree at Johns Hopkins. When she moved to New Orleans, she became director of medical illustration at Tulane Medical School. In 1974, she went to Ochsner Medical Foundation, also in New Orleans, where she stayed for two years. Nationally recognized as a medical illustrator, Sharon has had more than 800 illustrations published in medical and surgical journals and textbooks. For the last ten years, however, she has worked exclusively as a fine artist

Last year Sharon was named the Samson Feldman Visiting Scholar in Art as Applied to Medicine at the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in Baltimore, Md., and delivered a lecture, "From Medical Realism to Real Life." Last year also she took part in the exhibit, "Louisiana Realism in the '80s" at the Downtown Gallery in New Orleans.

An enthusiastic Pi Phi alumna, Sharon was equipment co-chairman during the 1987 Convention in New Orleans. She enjoys monthly meetings of the Arrow Investment Club, a group formed at that convention by those wanting to continue the afterglow of new friendships it had sparked. In April the group will trek

the trace to Natchez for a Pilgrimage Tour and stay at Monmouth House.

Sharon and her oncologist husband, Bob, are the parents of four young people: Susan, a Texas Alpha Pi Phi in her junior year of architecture at UT; Kathy, a sophomore med student at Stanford; daughter Ann, a freshman at Columbia along with her sophomore brother Bob, also at Columbia. Talent abounds in this charming family.

Almost all of Sharon's paintings are of people—everyday people she sees on the street, in the French Quarter,

on a visit to China or while driving through the rural South. When she spots an interesting face, out comes the camera, and when the painting emerges, it has the fine detail and exactness of the medical illustrator. Some day she hopes to travel out west to paint Indians and Mexican Americans, because she finds "their dark brooding faces have the same stoic aloofness that has endured the tragic drama of history and time."

Being a personal aide is position to be coveted

Calling someone a bag lady generally isn't complimentary, but Casey Healey, Oklahoma Beta, is thrilled with the designation! Casey is the personal assistant to Barbara Bush, the nation's first lady, and, as such, is the personal bag handler for Mrs. Bush.

Casey began working for Barbara Bush in August, 1987, committed through the campaign and inauguration. She was hired to accompany Mrs. Bush during the campaign, in charge of luggage, some scheduling, getting her in and out of engagements on time and keeping track of her purse.

Casey's job description hasn't changed too much since January 20. She does arrive in the first lady's East Wing office about 7:30 a.m., picks up the mail and delivers it to her boss, runs errands, does some typing and filing and keeps a log of Mrs. Bush's travel time. She might have to make a trip to the airport if a family member is arriving.

In a recent interview, published in *The Daily Ardmoreite* and written by C.A. Fuller, Casey said, "I go to all the events she goes to. I hold her purse. I held quite a few purses during the inauguration . . . I have been absolutely the luckiest person in the world."

Being a bag lady isn't exactly what Casey planned to do when she was studying at Oklahoma State. She was graduated in 1984 with a B.S. degree in business administration, majoring in finance. She was involved in many chapter and campus activities and was Oklahoma Beta's social chairman and Spring Sing director. She also made a name for herself in intramural sports and was named to the All-Greek basketball and football teams.

In 1985, Casey was doing volunteer work with the Republican party and working as a convention services manager at an Austin, Tex., hotel when she heard that Barbara Bush's personal aide had resigned. Casey applied for the position and though it went to someone else, she came away

from the tea and interview an inveterate fan of Mrs. Bush's!

It was back to her family's cattle ranch in Davis, Oklahoma for Casey where she planned to make that business her career. She stayed there for two years, making several trips to do advance work for the vice president. When Mrs. Bush's current aide resigned, Casey was asked to take the position.

In August it will be two years in the job for Casey and she says it's still new and exciting. She accompanied the Bushes on their European trip last year, visiting seven countries, and on the trip to Korea, China and Japan for Emperor Hirohito's funeral.

As Casey says, "The best way to see the world is with the President."

Mrs. Bush is her idol. "She is so real and so caring and she isn't going to change," says Casey. She and the President remind Casey of her own parents.

In August, Casey will take a look at her position and if her feelings of being impressed and excited are still with her, she hopes to continue being "The Bag Lady on Capital Hill."

Chapter House Corporations

The professionalism of Pi Beta Phi house corporation volunteers has never been more apparent than it is today! These dedicated Pi Phis are responsible for property valued in excess of \$60 million. They are informed, energetic, loyal and committed to providing the very best leadership possible in this highly specialized area of Pi Beta Phi. They deal with finances, taxes, liabilities, legalities, insurance, fire safety, building security, house directors and general property management.

Chapter housing is owned, rented or maintained by a house corporation incorporated under laws of the state or Canadian Province in which it is located. While membership of a chapter is ever changing, a house corpora-

tion is capable of perpetual existence.

In addition to long term existence, the corporation form is used for the protection from liability it offers chapter and Fraternity. In general, directors and officers of house corporations are not personally liable for debts and obliga-

tions of house corporations they serve.

Functions of house corporations and their boards of directors are to establish bylaws and policies of the corporation. They own, rent and maintain all real and personal property of the active chapter for the benefit of the chapter - in effect, act as landlord. They rent (in the case of owned property) or sublet (in the case of rental property) housing to the chapter under a written lease agreement. They hold an annual meeting with the chapter at which time a written financial report is submitted. Additional responsibilities are to make long range plans for buying or providing chapter housing and to handle payments on the mortgage, taxes, property insurance, remodeling and building of additions. Further, the board oversees and pays for all repairs, purchases all furnishings and replaces when necessary. An annual report is submitted to the national Director of House Corporations. An income tax return is also filed.

The corporation board treasurer is a member of the chapter finance committee and the board president signs the house director's contract. The board sees that housing is in excellent condition and attractive, that it is comparable to housing of other campus groups, that it helps maintain Pi Beta Phi's position in the Greek world and that it is a source of pride for collegians and alumnae.

The board of directors is elected, the number being determined by corporation bylaws. Each corporation is a separate legal entity with a non-profit tax classification. Boards are under the general supervision of the national Director of House Corporations.

Pi Beta Phi's national Director is in extensive commun-

ication with individual house corporations, their local accountants, attorneys, bankers and realtors, the IRS and university officials. She compiles information and statistics received throughout the fiscal year. She processes applications for Fraternity loans, dispensation and permission requests, revisions of Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws and various lease agreements. She advises in the formation and incorporation of new house corporations. She reports directly to the Grand Treasurer. She will sometimes visit a house corporation upon the direction of Grand Council following the request of the house corporation.

The chapter's responsibility

The chief responsibility of the chapter is to be a good tenant. In most cases, the university, along with Panhellenic, makes the decision as to what kind of housing each sorority is to have-house, lodge, suite, apartment or meeting room—with housing that is similar for all groups.

The chapter is responsible for paying rent to house corporation according to an annual agreement, for turning over the House Corporation Fund Fee and for sending in

parlor dues.

The chapter should feel able to make suggestions to the house corporation board concerning improvements in maintenance. It should see that house rules are written so that requests of the board regarding care, repair and maintenance of housing are promptly undertaken.

Chapter officers. AAC and the house director are responsible for maintaining housing during the school year and for seeing that members keep all property in good order. When misunderstanding occurs, it is the AAC who should take appropriate action in problem solving since behavior and conduct in chapter housing is the responsibility of chapter officers under the supervision of AAC.

As it is house corporation and AAC who work most closely with the chapter, it is essential that the AAC chairman and house corporation president and their committees work together to benefit the chapter and the Fraternity. These two groups are alumnae role models for collegians and will influence chapter membership for all time.

The AAC advisor for house management should be liaison between AAC and house corporation board and should represent AAC at HC board meetings when requested to attend. She needs to stress national house regulations and a workable plan for keeping the house locked 24 hours a day. She is to assist with annual inventory of household effects and housing closings for holidays. She is responsible for seeing that fire drills are held

each term and that all required safety precautions are observed.

Chapter houses have served as homes for Pi Phis since the first Fraternity rooms were established in 1887. They have provided a special collegiate living experience for our Pi Beta Phi women where they may live together while sharing their lives with others.

The quality of chapter housing impacts tremendously and completely on the well-being of each Pi Beta Phi chapter. It is achievable only because of outstanding alumnae house corporations and their boards of directors.

Mentor program is rewarding activity

North Carolina is one of the states leading in adolescent pregnancy. A concerted effort is underway to reduce teen out-of-wedlock pregnancies and North Carolina Betas participate in a program designed to reduce additional pregnancies among teen mothers as well as to reduce the rate of unintended pregnancies among young girls. A secondary goal is to improve teens' general skills for dealing with life's challenges.

Once a week, Pi Phis go to various schools in Durham as mentors to high risk girls in the third, fourth and fifth grades. As role models, Pi Phis present themselves in a positive manner and stress the importance of communication, education and the future. The cooperative program provides manuals to guide sessions with the girls. Frustrations, concerns and questions are commonly expressed during these one and a half hour sessions. In this short period of time, a number of close, strong relationships are formed through the intimate discussions shared by both groups.

Pi Phis have taken the responsibility of revising the manual, according to their experience, in hopes of improving the program and making it more efficient.

Those who participate in the Mentor Program are immediately rewarded with a sense of satisfaction. It is a great feeling to touch the lives of young girls who need just a little bit of extra attention.

Pi Beta Phi began its Graduate Consultant program in 1968-69 with one young woman, Martha Reynolds, traveling as special liaison between chapters and national officers. This highly successful program has grown, over the two decades since, into one of great reliability upon the talents, knowledge and enthusiasm of the consultants. Filling the positions this year are eight 1989 graduates, four of whom will visit chapters throughout the United States and Canada, and four others who will live, primarily, with new chapters. The Graduate Consultant program is financed in part through alumnae donations to the Friendship Fund.

Travelers

Lisa Dale Gossard, who prefers being called Dale, is an Indiana Epsilon from DePauw University in Greencastle. Her home is also in Greencastle. Dale earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in communications with a psychology minor. She held several chapter offices, including VP Moral, and was a member of the varsity golf team. For two years she was a newscaster on a local FM station. Her internship was in news and sports with the NBC-TV affiliate in Indianapolis. She hopes for a career in personnel/human resources or in law.

Values & Ethics Commission charts program for Greeks

Is this fraternity?

- Woman student dies after falling from a third story ledge of the chapter house after being ordered to clean outside windows...
- "Traditional" drinking exercise results in death of freshman pledge...
- Four fraternity men arrested and charged with sale and possession of cocaine...
- Freshman drops out of school because of humiliation he suffered from treatment during a fraternity party. . .

Is this fraternity?

No, this is not fraternity. All too often, however, such activities are a result of fraternity hazing, in the mistaken idea that demeaning a pledge makes him or her a better active member of the group. Inappropriate action on the part of some individuals within the Greek system has produced negative publicity that is harmful to all.

Robert E. Manley, in *Fraternal Law*, says, "We are on the threshold of a period when the new minority group that is legitimate game for society to attack is the Greek world. We are on the verge of an era of Greek bashing on campuses across the country. Greek systems on every campus must straighten up their acts."

Those acts include alcohol and drug use, hazing, sexual abuse, declining scholarship and a lack of respect for themselves, their organizations and society.

National officers of individual sororities and fraternities have urged their memberships to follow the ideals espoused by their organizations. This has not always been as effective as should be expected. Perhaps this stems from a failure on the part of national fraternities to adequately provide their members with programs to combat problems facing today's college population.

It is for that reason, in an effort to lessen the disparity between fraterni-

ty ideals and individual behavior, and to personalize these ideals in the daily undergraduate behavior, that the National Interfraternity Conference (NIC) appointed the Commission on Values and Ethics. That Commission is charged with identifying and promoting fraternity principles relating to the undergraduate. These principles should prove exciting and beneficial to each individual member.

The Commission is chaired by Edward M. King, Sigma Chi, Director of Residential Life and Student Judicial System at Bradley University. Serving with him on the Commission are Judy Abrahamson, Alpha Phi; Jonathan J. Brant, Beta Theta Pi, Executive Director of NIC: Dr. Patrick I. Brown, Alpha Tau Omega, president of NIC; Henry B. Poor, Executive Director of Psi Upsilon Foundation; Warren Richey, Sigma Nu, Director of Greek Affairs at Louisiana State University; Beth Saul, Alpha Epsilon Phi, chairman of the National Panhellenic Conference (NPC); Jean Wirths Scott, Pi Beta Phi; George W. Spasyk, Lambda Chi Alpha Executive Director; Gary R. Stone, Phi Kappa Sigma; and Dr. Ronald Taylor, Zeta Beta Tau.

Since the behavior of individuals reflects, both positively and negatively, on the fraternity system as a whole, the Commission will work to increase awareness of fraternity values through educational materials, programs, etc.

The following Basic Expectations have been developed by the Commission stating the fundamental guidelines by which fraternity men and women should govern their individual fraternal experiences.

1

I will know and understand the ideals expressed in my fraternity ritual and will strive to incorporate them in my daily life.

П

I will strive for academic achievement and practice academic integrity.

Ш

I will respect the dignity of all persons; therefore, I will not physically, mentally, psychologically or sexually abuse or haze any human being.

IV

I will protect the health and safety of all human beings.

V

I will respect my property and the property of others; therefore, I will neither abuse nor tolerate the abuse of property.

VI

I will meet my financial obligations in a timely manner.

VII

I will neither use nor support the use of illegal drugs; I will neither abuse nor support the abuse of alcohol.

VIII

I acknowledge that a clean and attractive environment is essential to both physical and mental health; therefore, I will do all in my power to see that the chapter property is properly cleaned and maintained.

IX

I will challenge all my fraternity members to abide by these fraternal expectations and will confront those who violate them.

In an effort to develop an awareness and appreciation of these basic values, a discussion of the nine points is essential. These discussions should include undergraduates, chapter advisors and other involved alumni and college and university administrators. A retreat format of at least a full day would be the best approach in presenting a Values and Ethics Workshop. In another approach, a series of workshops, extending over several weeks, could be utilized.

Case studies have been developed for each of the nine areas of Basic Expectations. These are to serve as a starting point for the discussion of each area and will be distributed, along with other educational material and formats developed by the Commission, by the national organizations. In addition, host organizations should feel free to develop their own case studies and augment information received.

Africa continues to fascinate Furnas duo

Mary Lou Heatherly Furnas, Illinois Zeta, graduated from the University of Illinois and interned in dietetics at the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco. She married David, now Chief of the Division of Plastic Surgery at the University of California, Irvine. They live in Corona del Mar, Calif.

One might think that this is the end of the story, but read on! Mary Lou's life has taken a far different turn from that which she expected as a young wife and mother. Her horizons have expanded to include the continent of Africa. In fact, East Africa has become a second home to her.

A resident of Nairobi, Kenya, in 1972-73, Mary Lou has returned to Nairobi for a month's visit almost every year since. As surgical assistant to her plastic surgeon husband, and as co-leader of the Explorers Club expedition to Western Kenya, her links to East Africa continue.

Mary Lou, David, and their three children, Heather, Brent and Craig, lived in Nairobi while David worked as surgeon for the East Africa Flying Doctor Service. The Service, part of the African Medical and Research Foundation (AMREF), was started in 1957 and delivers medical care to 50 mission and government hospitals in rural areas of Kenya and Tanzania. Headquarters are in Nairobi.

The Furnas family lived in a duplex in Nairobi, bought a Land Rover and camped in the bush at every opportunity. They enjoyed the proximity to wild animals. They learned to set up camp quickly, gather firewood and get the fire going before dark, and stay downwind from the lion. They had no problem with the wildlife except for vervet monkeys that raided the food supply.

Mary Lou, a registered dietitian, became a certified surgical technician in order to assist David in the African operating rooms. She learned to do medical photography also. The Furnas surgical team has worked also in Mindanao on four yearly trips to the southern Philippine province.

While Mary Lou and David have worked on a great variety of surgical problems, the bulk of their work in East Africa and the Philippines has been reconstruction of craniofacial problems caused by congenital deformities, trauma, tumors, burns and diseases such as leprosy.

David was leader and Mary Lou was co-leader of the Explorer Club expedition carrying flag #171 for the project "Ababare Emetwe — Skull Surgeons of the Kisii Tribe of Western Kenya." Trephination, the oldest therapeutic operation, was performed in many parts of the world in ancient times. The Kisii tribe has tribal healers who specialize in this procedure. Mary Lou and David have observed several of these craniotomies in the traditional setting. They feel that this surgery is likely to disappear with the progress of the times, and so it was important to document it. In April they returned the flag and presented the film "Kisii Craniotomies" at the Explorers Club in New York City.

Penny Bradley builds sales business from ground up

Judy Gregg Harper, Iowa Alpha, assistant manager at Sign of the Arrow gift shop in St. Louis, one of the finest needlepoint shops in the country, has been certified by the National Needlework Association as a master in advanced canvaswork. She also has her teacher certification from the organization.

To become a canvaswork master, Judy successfully completed all course prerequisites, then designed and created an original piece under the direction of Edie Feisner, a nationally recognized needlework designer and a fine arts professor at Montclair State College in New Jersey.

Classroom and correspondence certification requires a student to create and design an original canvaswork piece (pillow, picture, garment or accessory). Emphasis is placed on color and design; use of such fibers as silk, metallics, wool and floss, applique and reverse applique; and application of found objects. Students must apply the design to canvas either by painting, drawing or charting, then finish the project by blocking, mounting, etc. Projects must demonstrate the proper execution according to Association guidelines.

"I'm grateful to Sign of the Arrow for the opportunity to participate in the certification program," Judy said. "It is challenging to learn the intricate stitches and applications for certification. What is really exciting is the opportunity to teach these to others, and to see the fabulous results they achieve in their projects. We have some very interesting needlework being created through the shop."

As assistant manager at the shop, Judy is available Monday through Friday to help local stitchers with their needlepoint projects. Sign of the Arrow, a non-profit needlepoint and gift shop, is operated by volunteer Pi Phi alumnae. In 1988, the shop donated \$43,000 to ten local and regional charities, including Arrowmont.

Search for art starts business

Adding a touch of elegance to make a working place more habitable and unique is the idea behind Office Elan of Mississauga, Ontario, Canada. The lady behind the idea is Jane Looft Turner, Illinois Eta.

Ten years ago Jane had a highly successful career selling business services for a large international firm. But she wasn't happy. She had a husband and two young children whom she saw only in early morning or at night.

Then something happened. When her division in the company moved to temporary quarters until larger facilities could be located, Jane and two other employees were assigned to find some art for the barren walls. In their search, they found that either prices were too far out of line or the subject matter wasn't suitable.

That's when an idea began to take shape in Jane's head. Why not combine her business experience with the fine art knowledge she had gained at university? It became Jane's new challenge: an art consulting business providing works of art—paintings, original prints, sculpture—to corporate and office environments. In August, 1980, Office Elan Art Services Inc. came into being.

Blanche Huskey loves her weaving

"I have been weaving for Arrowcraft since 1941. I don't know how many years that is. Don't count it up!"

Blanche Huskey repeatedly begged her friends not to count it up, while Arrowcraft Manager, Mary Dale Swann continued counting out loud, exclaiming, "No, no Blanche, I think that's just miraculous!"

When it was decided that Blanche has been weaving for Arrowcraft for nearly 50 years, she beamed and said, "That's right. I don't get tired of it. I do it for pleasure now more than I do it for the money. I *like* the money, but I do it for *pleasure*."

Nella Hill, who has worked at Arrowcraft for 35 years and has been its designer since 1964, knows nearly as much about Blanche's career as Blanche does. "Since Blanche's husband, Beecher, has retired, he has started weaving, so he and Blanche work together."

Blanche explained Beecher's interest in weaving. "Well, he's always known about it. His sisters wove."

Beecher weaves the Yuletide mats, their daughter, Yvonne Coster, weaves napkins. Blanche is an extremely versatile weaver, but Beecher makes the Yuletide mats only.

Perhaps the hardest thing is to keep the selvedges straight. When making mats, the weavers customarily put on an 85 yard warp which makes 108-110 mats. When the mats are hemmed, or finished, they are taken to Nella at the shop, along with any unused yarn. Nella checks in the mats and distributes yarn for the next project.


Over the years Blanche has had the foresight to buy a piece of every design she's woven. Nella reports that Blanche has woven more than 75 different designs as an Arrowcraft cottage weaver, in addition to many special projects. She has no plans to quit weaving and said, "I'm not going to stop weaving 'til the Lord calls me home."

Donors are listed in hand-made book


Xi Province President Meg Jordan Bradley, took full advantage of her September visit to Arrowmont during the Pi Phi Officers' Workshop. Artist Chris Yarborough, Winston Salem, NC, was on campus at the time, teaching officers how to marbleize paper. Examples of her books were also on display in an Arrowmont exhibition called, "Regional Selections." Meg liked what she saw and she commissioned Chris to make a very special book for the large new chapter room in the Louisiana Alpha lodge.

"Meg asked me that day if I could to a book for the new room in New Orleans. I was excited about it. She needed it very soon, but I already had on hand the proper materials, so we agreed I would start on the project."

Chris designed the cover with a simplified raised arrow, using the Pi Phi pin as a model. "I used deep wine leather for the cover, and the end papers are marbleized in pale blue and deep wine with touches of gold. The paper I used for the pages is 100% cotton in pale blue."

Former student is A'mont assistant

Baton Rouge resident, Elizabeth Owen, is the kind of assistant not often found at Arrowmont. Each year approximately two dozen artists become quasi-staff members through the popular assistantship program. To have an assistant who is a Pi Phi is rare. Full time staff members who had been working alongside the Vanderbilt graduate were thrilled to learn that she is a Pi Phi, in addition to being a studio quiltmaker.

Budding professional artists from across the United States submit slide portfolios and applications in the hopes of being selected to participate in the assistantship program. Free classes with Arrowmont's distinguished faculty are what motivates most applicants.

Elizabeth had been an Arrowmont student several times and was encouraged to try for an assistantship by Staff Assistant Cynthia Huff. Cynthia remembers that, in class, Elizabeth was like a kid in a candy store.

Once on duty in March Elizabeth said, "There are so many reasons I love having an assistantship. It's sort of like being in graduate school in that it's quasi-professional. Running Arrowmont looks very effortless until you see how much there really is to do. It's nice to feel that, as assistants, we're needed, that there are things for us to do that are valuable. But what's really nice is there's a feeling for me that I really belong rather than just being one among 100 strangers coming in on Sunday night to register."

During a two week stint at Arrowmont, Elizabeth compared her perceptions of the place as an active to what it's really like. "What you see when you're in college is the Arrowcraft sales and you learn the history of the school as a pledge. My perception was that it was real traditional with people doing split oak baskets and woven table runners. When I got here I discovered it's a completely different environment and really exciting. Every

time I come I think that the money is being used for such a wonderful purpose, and yet chapter members don't really have a concrete idea of what's really going on here unless they come."

When asked if the Fraternity's money is being used in a beneficial way, Elizabeth said, "Oh, absolutely!"

"The facilities are really wonderful," said Elizabeth. "It's simply that when I'm here I feel like I'm right in the middle of what is going on at the moment in contemporary crafts. That's exciting."

While attending Arrowmont for one class, students can observe and sometimes try things that are going on in other classes. This "extra and unexpected" aspect of Arrowmont can be inspirational to many and neighboring classes have influenced Elizabeth in positive ways.

"It's sort of like lagniappe, which is a Louisiana tradition. For instance, when you go to a grocery store, or any kind of store, and you buy a whole bunch of stuff, the shop keeper will give you something extra for free. It's good public relations."

And it's part of the Arrowmont experience.



Headaches lead to artist's successful career change


Headaches altered Force Peterson Hunsicker's life and artistic career, but ultimately led to the creation of her business, Medalias. With the 1976 discovery of an acute allergy to petrochemicals, the artist, a Texas Alpha Pi Phi from Dallas, was relieved to know the source of the malaise which had plagued her for so many years. Yet, simultaneously, she was devastated that her passion for oil painting would have to be aborted.

It was while reapplying techniques and skills she acquired from earning a BFA degree from the University of Texas, studying portrait painting at Corcoran Museum in Washington, DC, and fashion drawing and painting at the Art Students League in New York City, that Foree accidentally found a new outlet for her artistic expression—designing jewelry and one of a kind clothing.

Having always enjoyed working with her hands, she made a necklace and crocheted vest for herself. Both received so many compliments and inquiries, she began selling her pieces. With the opening of China, she began incorporating antique Chinese silver pieces with semi precious stones in her jewelry. To coordinate with her tops of ribbon crochet, she restored Chinese antique men's skirts and later designed jackets using pieces of 100 year old Chinese silk embroidery.

Because of her fervent attraction to the unusual and to antique silver, Foree chose a new direction when she became enthralled by the unique designs of the American luggage tag. Searching from coast to coast, she has amassed one of the largest and finest collections anywhere of these sterling silver items, popular in the 1800s among affluent American families in the era of steamship and railroad travel. At the suggestion of her husband of 29 years, she began casting exact tag reproductions in sterling silver and conceived the "Luggage Tag" necklace.

In 1987, her Medalias company was formed, with three necklaces and one earring encompassing her

entire line. Now Medalias has grown to more than nine necklaces and 20 earrings, plus bracelets, pins, key chains and luggage tags. Examples of her work can be found in art galleries, museums and fine specialty stores across the country.

Approached by the Dallas Museum of Art, Foree was asked to design a line of jewelry in the southwestern influence to offer in the museum's gift shop during its Georgia O'Keeffe exhibition, last July through October.

Foree masterminded a special piece in honor of the occasion por-

traying the style for which O'Keeffe is noted. She handcrafted an exact miniature replica of a familiar weathered longhorn skull strung on rare antique African white heart beads, yellow jade beads, turquoise beads or silver dimes, allowing for a selection of color. She also designed earrings and a pin bearing the same weathered skull, complementing the necklace.

Since the exhibition in the Museum of Art, Foree's skull design was purchased by several retail stores for the spring season.

A very special day

She rolled herself down the hall. Her feet alternately helped along. "Nothing and nothing and all I do all day is nothing... nothing." she mumbled quietly to herself. Her eyes were wild, unaware of our presence as we quietly passed by her. I bent my head low to avoid another encounter such as this one and I silently prayed for strength to make it through this early Saturday morning.

When I signed my name to volunteer as part of Texas Gamma's community interest program, I had no idea that an hour of volunteer work was going to change my perspective on aging.

I went to breakfast this morning wishing I could have had one more hour of sleep. Eight o'clock was just too early to entertain the thought of volunteer work. I complained to a friend that I HAD to write letters for some old people as part of a community service project. Those were the words I used to describe them—"old people." But I had forgotten something when my friend said, "You are going to do something good for someone and you are complaining about it?"

He was right, so very right. These are people after all, I thought to myself. These are the neighbors God told us to love as ourselves. My selfishness diminished and my attitude quickly changed. I thought about what my friend had said on the way to the hospitality center.

When I arrived at the center, my sisters were in the lobby. We waited to receive our assignments. I was given the name of an elderly lady who wanted me to write a letter for her. Luckily another Pi Phi offered to help out and give me support. We walked down the hall, looking for the room number we were assigned. As we reached the room, I knocked on the door and explained who I was and why I was there. The lady inside was hard of hearing but eventually she told me that she would rather not have me write letters for her because she was too tired. She never even opened the door.

I wasn't sure what I was supposed to do after that. Other Pi Phis wandered aimlessly around. They too had been rejected. While we discussed our dilemma, an orderly, overhearing the conversation, pointed toward a room and said that the woman inside would like us to visit with her. I was excited that someone finally wanted to talk with us.

She sat in her small chair and her eyes beamed when she saw us. I knelt next to her and introduced myself. Obviously she was somewhat hard of hearing because she insisted on calling my friend Rochelle, not Michelle. We let it slip by with a smile and asked the lady if she would like us to write a letter for her. She said she didn't really have anyone to write, but that she would love for us just to sit and talk with her for a while. We did just that.

Her daughter was out of town visiting her own children. The lady insisted that she approved of her daughter's trip, even though it meant leaving her in the care of a nursing home. But I could see in her eyes that she wished her daughter had never gone. Her expressions showed her desperation for an eager ear for her wisdom, an open heart for her loneliness and an extended hand to join her in friendship on this Valentine's day.

We talked for almost an hour and when we were ready to leave, she asked us to sign her guest book and thanked us for making her morning so bright. It seemed her eyes shone with a new sparkle.

I could feel a hint of sadness among my friends as we turned to leave, each wondering if we would see her again. I walked down the hall quietly. Things I had planned for the rest of the day didn't seem so important. Thinking about my earlier reluctance made me realize something I had not anticipated. I had never expected an early Saturday Valentine's morning could be as rewarding as the one I spent that day. I never expected that one hour could make me feel so good.

The work of the Commission has been developing over the past year as a result of continuing concern over the direction being taken by Greek groups on various campuses. Alcohol abuse, negative public relations, image, scholarship and hazing have combined to confuse the goals of fraternal living, both within the organization themselves and in the mind of the general public.

For this reason, men's and women's fraternities are working together to restore the original purpose of fraternity.

"We are hopeful," says Chairman King, "that efforts of the Commission, combined with those of NIC/NPC, will narrow the apparent gap between fraternal expectations and everyday reality. The Commission envisions a five to eight year period to implement this program."




Denise is very active on campus. She has been president of Panhellenic Council, is a Telesis Ambassador and a member of Alpha Lambda Theta honor society.

Outstanding volunteer honored by Hospice

Frances Peck Thompson, Oklahoma Alpha, of Armore, Okla., has been honored for Outstanding Volunteer Service by the Oklahoma State Hospice organization. Frances is one of the organizers of Cross Timbers Hospice in Ardmore, and she and her husband, James, were the driving force that started the needed service.

When Frances started talking about forming an organization that could provide home care through volunteer service to terminally ill patients and their families, the first person really interested was a nurse, Kay Trager. The women met at the beauty shop, exchanged phone numbers, and later Frances met with a group of nurses gathered by Trager to discuss the idea.

When an anonymous \$5,000 contribution was received to start the organization, the first five-member board was formed. That was in March, 1982. In June of that year, Cross Timbers received its first patient. Since then, the organization has helped families of about 185 terminally ill patients in Carter County.

Frances was secretary of the board of directors for six years and is currently on the advisory board. She has been active in such fund-raising efforts as garage sales, salad luncheons, pot luck dinners, the Ardmore Little Theater benefit performances and others.

"With people like Frances Thompson involved, hospice will survive forever," said Cross Timbers executive director Mary Corbett.

May Keller fund benefits from contest

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
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
