Two Pi Phis Collaborate on Past 25 Years of Fraternity

Such a precious piece of work is "The History of Pi Beta Phi 1967-1992." The book, to be available this fall, chronicles the growth and changes of Pi Beta Phi in the last twenty-five years. This "labor of love" is a collaborative effort of former National Historian Barbara Sands Olsen and former ARROW Editor Marilyn Simpson Ford.

Barbara Olsen has served as National Historian since 1983. A former alumnae club president, province president and national director, Barbara served on Grand Council as Grand Vice President of Alumnae from 1975 to 1979. Barbara enjoys sharing her knowledge of Pi Phi's past and often speaks at Founders' Day celebrations, Pi Phi Conventions and other special fraternity events dressed in period clothing as one of the Founders.

For more than twenty years, Marilyn Ford edited The ARROW. It was for this kind of lovalty and devotion that Marilyn received the Dorothy Weaver Morgan Award in 1989. But Pi Phis weren't the only ones recognizing Marilyn for her contributions. Her fraternal publishing peers presented her with the Evin C. Varner Award in 1991 for betterment of the Greek world in the area of communications. Following her retirement as editor in 1989, Marilyn was appointed coauthor with Barbara of the 25-year history update of the Fraternity.

"A Century of Friendship in Pi Beta Phi" by Jean Orr Donaldson encompasses the first one hundred years of Pi Beta Phi. In 1977, Jean wrote "A Century of Friendship, Part II" which was printed as the winter 1977 issue of The ARROW. At a later date, it was decided that the information from that update would be combined with information from the next 15 years to form a 25-year history.

Chapters of "The History of Pi Beta Phi 1967-1992" are organized by topics. Collegiate and alumnae activities, philanthropies, conventions, national officers and committees, fraternity administration, and The ARROW are among the many facets of fraternity life covered.

In the forward of the book, Barbara and Marilyn said, "Memories are emotional pictures or visions, and thus are with us for our lifetime. A written history is the memory of things past – all things. Our hearts, so deeply a part of emotion, help us recall the good of what has passed before, and our minds paint the pictures of the past."

The Fraternity is indebted to these two women who have donated their time and talents so that all of us may share in the rich heritage of our Pi Beta Phi. We thank you!

A Retrospect of Convention 1993

There's simply no magic like the magic of friendship, and never was it more apparent than when over 900 Pi Beta Phi members gathered at the Stouffer Orlando Resort for the 59th Biennial Convention of the Fraternity.

Pi Phis from across the continent made their way to Orlando, Florida and the beginning of convention festivities June 19. Collegians and alumnae were able to meet Pi Phi's Grand Council and mingle with other convention attendees at the opening reception on Saturday afternoon. The Orlando Convention Committee welcomed everyone at the Opening "Pi Phi Magic" Dinner which was spectacular.

Following dinner, Pi Phis proceeded to the general session room for the Opening Meeting of Convention. National and province officers and special guests were introduced and announcements were made. The meeting was adjourned, but collegiate and alumnae delegates had more business to complete at province meetings.

Sunday morning Pi Phis joined for a devotional service and memorial service honoring those members who had died since the 1991 Convention. Pi Phi Reverend Diane Dugoni Shoaf conducted the devotional service. Grand Vice President of Philanthropies Betty Lofton conducted the Memorial Service in which

the Chapter Presidents from each collegiate chapter and a representative for the chapters no longer in existence participated.

Pi Beta Phi legacies were honored during Sunday's luncheon. The luncheon was also the place for a special celebration – that of the 100th

Anniversary of the alumnae department. Alumnae province and national officers treated all attendees with a birthday celebration song. During the luncheon, Grand President Jo Ann Roderick announced that a new award had been established in recognition of the formation of the alumnae department in 1893. The Emma Harper Turner Alumnae Leadership Award will be given annually, beginning in 1994, for exceptional leadership by an alumna.

On Sunday afternoon, Pi Phis were able to witness the initiation of Alumna Honor Initiate Carol Stanley Fenner. Carol is a prominent civic leader in the Orlando community. She describes herself as a "career volunteer," who began volunteer work during her childhood at a crippled children's hospital. Carol is currently the Metropolitan Opera's Florida Auditions Director and is a former president of the Orlando Opera Company. A graduate of Newcomb College-Tulane University, Carol also studied at Sorbone University in Paris, France. Carol's enthusiasm for the

Fraternity and its members was unending and she stayed for the duration of convention so as not to miss a minute of the activities.

A convention favorite is the Dinner by Chapter.
Adding to the excitement of the night is the new tradition of the Parade of Banners. This tradition began at the 1991
Convention in commemoration and salute to the Fraternity as it began its 125th year. Chapter names are called in order of colonization, as the chapter's banner is presented. The

finale of the parade was the presentation of the Fraternity's banner by National Historian Barbara Sands Olsen, who gave an intriguing historical talk after the meal.

Many collegiate awards were presented at the conclusion of dinner. The Dorothy Weaver Morgan Award for fraternity loyalty was also presented on Sunday evening. Jean Orr Donaldson was named the 1993 winner of this prestigious Pi Phi award. Jean is the author of "A Century of Friendship in Pi Beta Phi" which she compiled while she was National Historian from 1963-1967. She painstakingly researched 100 years of records, memorabilia, fraternity correspondence, and archive materials such as pictures, letters and old minute books contributed by members through the years. She spent a year in the actual writing of this comprehensive history of the Fraternity and the thousands of women who have worn the arrow during its first century.

Following the dinner, women were given the opportunity to find out up close and personal what its like to be a graduate consultant during "Meet the



Consultants." Former graduate consultants shared experiences and the consultants for the upcoming year were introduced. All in attendance were made familiar with the selection process for Pi Phi's graduate consultants.

Pi Phi's NPC Delegate Jean Scott was honored at the luncheon by Grand Council and presented with a jeweled pin from Balfour jewelers. Jean serves as NPC's Treasurer for the

1991-93 biennium and will become the conference's president in 1995.

Convention Body Votes on Ritual

A report was given on the ritual study conducted as a result of the motion adopted at the 1991 Convention to explore a possible need to revise current Fraternity ritual. An eight-member Ritual Study Committee, consisting of four alumnae and four active members, was appointed by Grand Council and met twice in Central Office during the interim of Conventions to conduct a survey of the membership, evaluate the results and, from these, make a recommendation to the voting body at Convention.

The thoughts of over 7,000 members of Pi Beta Phi were represented when Ritual Study Surveys were completed by 89 chapters, 171 organized alumnae groups, and by 91 individuals who took advantage of the opportunity to participate if unable to attend a meeting at which a survey

was completed. The Committee tabulated and then evaluated the results of the surveys, and, bearing in mind the purpose of ritual, its history, and the value of diversity among the membership, made a recommendation for some revision.

A similar study of the Fraternity ritual twenty years ago showed 9% of the then membership wanted some revision. Results of the 1991-93 ritual survey indicate 30% of the membership favor change and even more indicated some change would be acceptable if it were deemed necessary. However, the vote on a motion to adopt the recommendation of the Committee that the ritual be revised to contain more inclusive language was defeated by a majority of those voting. Thus, the Pi Beta Phi ritual remains as it has been recited for over one hundred vears. **

Alice Weber Johnson Honored

During the General Session on Sunday morning, former Grand President and Missouri Beta Alice Weber Johnson was named Grand President Emeritus. In accepting the honorary title, Mrs. Johnson follows in the footsteps of such Pi Phi "greats" as May L. Keller and Marianne Reid Wild.

Mrs. Johnson served the Fraternity as Grand President from 1958 to 1967. It was during Mrs. Johnson's tenure that Pi Beta Phi moved its Central Office to St. Louis, Missouri and adopted its Centennial Project, now known as Arrowmont.

The Alice Weber Johnson Bowl, a large silver punch bowl, was presented to the Fraternity by the St. Louis Alumnae Club at the Washington D.C. Convention in 1962, in honor of Mrs. Johnson. This award is given each year to the chapter which has ranked most often among the top ten chapters for the past ten years.

The Orlando Convention body had been charmed by Mrs. Johnson during the course of convention as she addressed the group. It seemed there was nothing she could say that didn't delight all. Upon hearing of her new title, Mrs. Johnson was nearly left without words to express her feelings. With a look of utter astonishment on her face and tears welling in her eyes, she shared a most gracious and humble "thank you." a

tions, the skit starred national and province officers. The Fraternity's Grand Council made a cameo appearance that nearly stole the show and brought the audience to their feet. But the night was not yet over. Pi Phis were then treated to a spectacular laser and fireworks display.

The Foundation sponsored the keynote speaker for Tuesday morning's general session. Dr. Richard Keeling is a Director of the University of Health Service and Professor of Internal Medicine (Hematology) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. His speech, accompanied by visual aids, centered on the many problems on our college campuses today: unwanted pregnancy, AIDS, alcohol abuse, eating disorders etc. He theorized that college students don't do what they know (is right or should be

done) because they do what they see in the media, they do what they feel and are overwhelmed, and because they don't have a sense of community. The strategies we can use to help students make better decisions include building self-esteem, developing skills and providing support.

California and the new national officers were installed. The one and only Courtesy Resolutions Committee and the "Magic in Review" slide presentation highlighted the activities of the week.

Pi Phi Documents To Be Revised

In the fall of 1992, Grand Council appointed a committee to study a revision of the Constitution and Statutes and Policies and Standing Rules. The committee met in November of 1992 to discuss revising these documents; not to change the content, but to make them more user friendly.

Chairman Carrie Mae Blount, Legislative Committee Chairman Lisa Masters, Grand Vice President of Finance Lou Ann Montgomery Carter, former Alumnae Province President Marga Larson Bales and former Grand President and National Panhellenic Delegate Jean Wirths Scott comprise the study committee.

In commenting on the committee and its work, Grand President Jo Ann Roderick said, "The more we read and worked with our documents, the more we realized they have been patched so much they read like a 'crazy quilt.'" Revision of the documents will make them easier to use and also

mean fewer legislative changes at future conventions.

During Wednesday afternoon's business session,
the convention body
accepted this committee.
Plans are to have a draft of
the revised Constitution and
Statutes and Policies and
Standing Rules in members' hands by next fall in
order to have them perfected in time for 1995
Convention legislation.





Second Resident Artist Exhibition A Success

everal Sevier County landmarks were a focal point of "East Meets Midwest," the resident artist exhibition hosted by Arrowmont School last spring. On display April 22 - May 15, 1993, "East Meets Midwest" featured screenprinted collages on fabric by Fenella Belle, enamel sculptures by metalsmith Lisa Costello, drawings, prints, and handmade books by Eleanor Droll, and wheel thrown, altered pottery by Diane Rosenmiller. The 72 pieces represented artwork created during the artists' nine-month residencies at Arrowmont.

Fenella Belle of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania holds a B.F.A. in fibers from University of the Arts in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. After graduating in 1988, Belle was an apprentice fabric printer at The Fabric Workshop in Philadelphia. She went on to teach various adult education classes and was involved in community based afterschool programs for children in the Philadelphia area. Before being selected as an Artist-In-Residence in 1992, Belle operated a small fabric printing business called Fenella Belle Fabrics.

During her nine-month stay in Gatlinburg, Belle was influenced by local popular culture. Of her five works on display, two featured a dinosaur and a gun toting rooster, prominent landmarks in neighboring Pigeon Forge.

Lisa Costello is from Chicago, Illinois. She holds a B.F.A. in art history and metalsmithing/design from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana.

In an effort to achieve the organic forms that she finds intriguing, Costello conducted experiments in electroplating during her tenure at Arrowmont. She explained, "My cur-

rent work is an investigation of figurative elements set within a narrative environment." She adds that her "Wise Women" series, using organic forms based on vegetables such as yams and carrots, is an attempt to "evoke a dreamlike state that intertwines humor with the grotesque." She chooses to work with metal for its three-dimensionality on an intimate scale, and with enamels for their richness, vitality and vibrancy.

Kansas City, Kansas artist Eleanor Droll earned a B.A. from the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and a M.F.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Before beginning her nine-month residency at Arrowmont School, Droll was a printer's assistant at Tandem Press, an experimental printmaking workshop in Madison, involved in the production of large prints for prominent visiting



artists such as Chuck Close and Janet

Droll's own drawings and prints are figurative and deal with the opposites of body and spirit.

"My concern for the work," Droll said, "is that it represent that sense of duality and the struggle between the desires of the physical body rooted in the earth, and the pure, ethereal spirit that hovers above it."

York, Pennsylvania potter Diane Rosenmiller holds a B.F.A. in Ceramic Art from New York State College of Ceramics, School of Art and Design, Alfred University in Alfred, New York. To ensure that her glazing remains bright and clean, she works primarily with porcelain. The forms and elements of her tableware are reminiscent of vegetables, flowers and shells. One of her signature production forms is a ewer-like creamer with a distinctive crown of triangular leaves.


During her nine-month residency, Rosenmiller developed a series of pieces that work well together both in shape and color. She said it is important to her that the pieces be used, therefore her search for harmonious combinations of matte and shiny glazes, went on during the nine months she spent refining and developing forms that are user friendly and aesthetically pleasing.

Senior Focus and the Friendship of Pi Beta Phi

ast year, the Foundation established Senior Focus - a program specially designed for graduating seniors. Upon graduation, collegians are invited to join the tradition of alumnae support by making a pledge to the Foundation over a fouryear period. Senior Focus was enthusiastically embraced by the class of 1992 and the class of 1993 has accepted the challenge set before it by the preceding class. The seniors of 1993 have committed their financial support to the Foundation and many have included suggestions and offered their volunteer time to the Foundation. Others have written about the importance of Pi Phi in their lives. One letter in particular summarized what Pi Phi means to so many, and why a member feels the importance of supporting the Foundation.

In April, Norma Nicol Hamilton, California Theta, sent in her Senior Focus '93 pledge with a letter. Norma began by saying that it was a privilege to respond to the Senior Focus '93 request as a graduating senior. Norma was initiated in January 1992 at the University of California at Davis. Her first affiliation with Pi Phi, however, was in 1959 at the University of Arizona. At that time, Norma pledged Arizona Alpha with the hopes of initiating shortly thereafter. Unfortunately, she was unable to continue at the University and was never initiated into Pi Beta Phi.

Many years later, Norma returned to college and began working to complete her bachelor's degree. Norma writes, "Whenever I drove by the chapter house on Russell Boulevard in Davis, there was always a twinge of hope in my heart and a nagging question within me – 'Could I ever become a fully initiated Pi Phi after all this time?' "She made inquiries of two Pi Phi friends, Patricia Johnson Hewitt (Pennsylvania Beta) and Joyanne Wolf Paquette (Arizona Alpha) telling them, "...my pledge pin had been sitting in my jewelry box – a continu-

ing reminder of the Pi Phi friends in my 'first college life' and I wanted to wear 'the whole arrow.' "

In her letter, Norma reinforced what the value of Pi Phi friendships has been to her over the past years. Several Pi Phi alumnae, including women from Arizona Alpha who were present when Norma pledged in 1959, were present at her initiation at California Theta. Norma says about the initiation experience, "This was a moving, unforgettable experience for me – truly a living testimony to what the circle and magic of friendship within the Fraternity means."

Norma graduated this past June with a bachelor's degree in U.S. history and a minor in Native American studies. She will continue her Pi Phi involvement by serving on California Theta's Alumnae Advisory Committee. She writes that she could not have sent her gift to the Foundation without acknowledging how much Pi Phi has meant to her. She ended her letter stating, "...with deepest gratitude to my Fraternity for reaccepting me and for the friendships that I know will continue to grow in the wine and blue."

Arts Commission Awards \$7,000

rtist-in-Residence and Children's Program components of the Campaign for Arrowmont are beneficiaries of a \$7,000 grant from the Tennessee Arts Commission.

he Fraternity's alumnae clubs will join together in the next three years to fulfill a pledge of \$200,000 to name the top floor in Arrowmont's new dormitory, the Founders' Floor. A committee of Alumnae Province Presidents, headed by Ann Denker Webster, Arkansas Alpha, announced the three-year plan to alumnae club delegates attending convention.

Listed as the Campaign's top priority, both in dollar and in physical need, a new dormitory has attracted the Campaign's largest leadership pledges and gifts to date. The new housing facility is scheduled to open this fall at a cost of \$1.3 million.

Nashville Gift Exceeds Quarter Million

he Nashville Alumnae Club and its Christmas Village Board have increased their leadership support of the Campaign for Arrowmont to a total of \$260,000.

Fulfilling its first pledge of \$100,000, the club has announced an additional \$160,000 pledge toward construction of the new dormitory. In recognition of Nashville's outstanding leadership support to the Campaign, the following portions of the dormitory will bear commemorative plaques in the Nashville club's name: multi-purpose room, staff apartment, two residential galleries, outdoor sculpture garden and landscaping.

\$2.3 Million Campaign at 70% of Goal

he capital and endowment Campaign for Arrowmont has surpassed the \$1.6 million mark toward its \$2.3 million goal. This announcement was made in June during the convention's Academy of Angels award festivities to honor leadership donors.

More than 60 Campaign donors were recognized in the convention audience and nineteen individuals and leadership clubs were recognized for gifts of \$10,000 or more. To date, more than 350 friends of Arrowmont and the Fraternity are supporting the Campaign.

Holt House

A "Hitchcock" Mystery of Sorts Still Unsolved

elving into Pi Phi's history is like going on a treasure hunt; you may not find exactly what you are looking for, but you are certain to find some gem. I found unexpected treasure while I was hoping to uncover the story of the Hitchcock settle, commonly called a "mammy's bench," on display in the Historical Room of Holt House.

Shortly after I had decided that no ARROW readers were going to respond to my request for information about our rare piece of furniture, I received a letter with a photo of guess what...yes, a rocking bench almost identical to our Holt House rocking settee! I eagerly read the letter and learned that the bench in the photo belonged to the writer's grandfather. She remembers seeing the bench in the general store her grandfather opened in 1888 after he retired from the sea. The bench, she recalls, was a favorite place for the old sea-captains to sit while they spun yarns about their sea-faring days.

Abby Sargent Neese Kelly, the writer of the letter, is a 1930 initiate of Maine Alpha (University of Maine, Orono). She says, "I am a staunch supporter, going back to Orono each May for reunions, and I have established a scholarship award for creative writing there." A former teacher and Dean of Women at the University of Maine, she is an avid traveler and writer, with five books to her credit — four published and one waiting to be printed. She "has always been active" in the Philadelphia-Main Line Alumnae Club, and she has served as Pennsylvania State President of the National League of American Pen Women (NLAPW).

I still do not know how Holt House came to have its Mammy's Bench, but because of my search I have found a fascinating new Pi Phi friend. "Thank You, Holt House," and "Thank You, Pi Beta Phi!"




200- meter backstroke, and was a twotime honorable mention All-American. She was also a member of Golden Key national honor society.



The funds will establish eight additional Eberly Family Distinguished Professorships, bringing the total to 17; endow the college's scholarship program for talented undergraduates; provide additional faculty development support; and provide resources for curriculum development and enhancement.

Last school term, her students learned what it was like to be disabled when Jill brought wheelchairs, goggles, earphones and canes into the classroom for her students to use. She was able to show her students what life is like for people with handicaps. Last spring, Jill earned an MDA personal achievement award which recognized the barriers she overcomes in teaching, and how much her teaching influences others.

Indiana Beta Patti Alsop Bell, a kindergarten teacher, was presented with the Golden Apple Award from a television station in Terre Haute, Indiana. A total of 420 teachers throughout Indiana were nominated for the honor.

T e were the first class to graduate following Pearl Harbor . . on that "day that will go down in infamy," our 22 seniors in the Pi Phi house at Northwestern were in the usual December Sunday crunch of returning from church in time for the best dinner of the week, finishing term papers due before holidays, Christmas tea dances, the usual relaxing and "catch up day." That safe, warm loving refuge we had in our sorority house was blown away in the next few hours by our radios (A.D. 1942 - pre CNN). The university calendar gave the seniors a week after exams to wait for graduation, so someone had the bright idea to take a house together at Lake Geneva for three days to play and say farewell. Our group did explode rather like popcorn after graduation day to all corners of the U.S. Close contact was our first casualty of the war. Nine of the happy group did make it back in 1957 for the 15th Reunion and the Pi Phis took the cup for the largest returning representation, shades of what we had in togetherness.

All of a sudden, we turned around twice and we were grandmothers! The university was telling us to look forward to a great 50th reunion of our class!

There were several years that Christmas cards kept saying "let's get the ball rolling" but busy people, few addresses. Florida has a small nucleus of this good class so one day (must've been a rainy one), an attempt was made to gather two others for a planning luncheon meeting in the center of the state. This was about the largest difficulty of the process for winter Florida residents only have time for guests and all those folks who "wouldn't pass by without seeing you!" Many phone calls finally found a good day for all three and the excitement

Lauderdale had a front tire blowout but her life was saved by the seatbelt. Jeanne Marshall Byers, driving over from Sanibel Island, was hit at an intersection by a drunk driver. What is the message here? Good reunions are not easy . . but worth it. B.B. Clarkson McCollom issued a bulletin to all members of the class relating these monumental efforts in their behalf and declared A CALL TO REUNION - JUNE '92.

This all took place a year and a half prior to the reunion.

Responses were quick, enthusiastic, encouraging and with the timely suggestion by Pat King Nickel that we all take a bus! Through these first answers, we learned we have lost forever four members of that wonderful class.

The majority decided to gather for two days of pure Pi Phi reunion prior to university activities. Instructions were then given to make reservations at a favorite local hotel so we could be together. Of our remaining 18 pledge sisters, we had 15 planning to attend. Arrangements were made by our over worked local "cruise directors," Ginny Buhrke Hall and Norma Catrambone.

We met on June 17th for a cocktail party in B.B.'s room - girls only! Remember the squeals and screams emanating from Pi Phi halls at exciting times like pledging, pinning.. that's just how our hotel corridor sounded as the "girls" convened. Of course we knew each other ... smiles never change, albeit was a shock to see our Navy Ball Queen Norma Jordan Catrambonel in white hair rather than black.

The group then departed for dinner - no husbands allowed. (By limos, please, so we lose no drivers in the 50 years of changes in the North Shore.)

The following morning, after breakfast, the group embarked on a campus walk. (Under the same old trees, on the same old paths ... remembering what happened here and there. Why ever did they move the rock? Here's where Norma and Bev (Coffman Wheatley) stood when their pic was taken for the cover of the Syllabus. Where are we now ... behind the library? A passing student tells us "No, ladies, this is the new Humanities Building." "Oh, really," answered Jeanne ... "we only graduated a couple of years ago!")

After the campus tour the group gathered at the Pi Phi House. Our inspection found some things never change while other things do. "Look at this gorgeous pink bathroom ... yup, the coke machine is still in the back hall ... but seventy-five cents!'

Our sister-in-residence and tour director extraordinaire, Ginny Buhrke Hall, had fabulous box lunches delivered for us and there we were, back in our dining room acting like coeds only showing pics of grandchildren and not talking of prom dresses or homecoming decorations. Can you believe we then went up to the parlor and sang Pi Phi songs?

Then came the piece de'resistance of the day the old movies! We laughed at our clowning, we cried over those cute girls gone from us forever ... and we screamed at the hat and white glove girls so very spiffy at their Senior Luncheon with the alum club. We looked at the old films twice on the huge screen through the VCR.

In the evening, everyone joined for cocktails and dinner with their husbands.

On the morning of June 19th, we had our final Pi Phi activity, a bus tour of the city so that all could see the amazing things Chicago has done in 50 years. It was after this event, that university festivities began.

All agreed that our Pi Phi days were unbeatable. That's not all . . we have vowed to do it again and again. It was suggested and approved that every two or three years we plan a cruise or meet at "some swell" resort or national park for more days of just being together with people who meant so very much to us at an important time in our lives ... and still do.





The Illinois Epsilons at Northwestern University devoted much of their "Rock the Arrow" philanthropy week to Links to Literacy efforts. Members spent one afternoon at the Total Child Center, a multi-cultural/multi-lingual pre-school, in Evanston, Illinois. The Illinois Epsilons read, played games and spent time with the three- and four-year-old children who attend the school. Two days later, chapter members spent the afternoon producing a reader's theatre for the residents of Wagner Health Center, a rehabilitation center for older persons, in Evanston. Since the Northwestern Pi Phis were scheduled for a mixer with the Northwestern Chi Psis later in the week, the chapter invited the men's fraternity to join them in their philanthropy at the health center. After the Illinois Epsilon's performance of "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere" and Shel Silverstein's The Giving Tree, the Pi Phis and the men from Chi Psi visited with the residents over refreshments and then became participants in a spontaneous songfest.

The New Haven, Connecticut Alumnae Club, the Southern Fairfield County. Connecticut Alumnae Club and the Connecticut Beta Chapter at Yale University are joining together to establish and support a Pi Beta Phi Children's Library in the new Children's Hospital of the Yale New Haven Hospital. The two alumnae clubs and the collegiate chapter viewed separately a slide presentation of the Pi Beta Phi Children's Library at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston, a library established and supported by the Houston Alumnae Club. Inspired by the Houston

Alumnae Club's story and realizing the need for a similar library in the New Haven, Connecticut facility, the three groups of Pi Beta Phis, each too small to shoulder the project alone, decided to combine forces. The Pi Beta Phi Children's Library at Yale New Haven is scheduled to open in October 1993. The library will be staffed by Pi Phis including an alumna who is a candidate for a master's degree in library science. an alumna who is a high school librarian, other alumnae and collegiate members of Connecticut Beta.

The Pi Beta Phis at Duke University are finding that it takes only one Pi Phi to start making a difference in local literacy service. Tina Clarke, a North Carolina Beta junior, has established a tutoring program at a local Durham elementary school. Members of North Carolina Beta and other students at Duke each commit a couple of hours a week to tutoring individuals and entire classes at the school. There are currently fifty volunteers, and the number grows each semester. The Pi Phis report that while the students gain academic assistance and

young adult role models, the volunteers gain a sense of pride and perspective.

The San Francisco Alumnae Club's annual May meeting and book drive involved about thirty youngsters. After corresponding, throughout the school year, with fifth-graders at a local elementary school, the Pi Phis finally met their pen pals at a party held in the students' classroom. The San Francisco alumnae arrived at the school bearing pizza, books and cameras. Each student took home a book and a Polaroid snapshot of him or herself. The Pi Phis and the children finalized the matching for new pen pals, to begin over the summer months and continue throughout the school year.

Illinois Iota Denise Kathleen Kantola received the title of Miss North Shore in March. She will now continue and compete for Miss Illinois. Denise has incorporated Links to Literacy into her platform by advocating the importance of reading. She has created her own program, Reading Readiness, in which she stresses the importance of motivation at home and educational strategies. She has volunteered for Links to Literacy with the Illinois State University Pi Phis for the past two years.

The Northern New Jersey Alumnae Club recently found a way to combine Links to Literacy with their ongoing philanthropic work at a local battered women's shelter. Club members were able to raise enough funds at a garage sale to buy over 100 books for the pre-school at the Babyland Shelter for Battered Women.
