Pi Beta Phi's 1995-97 Grand Council

Wednesday, June 28 at the 1995 Convention, Pi Beta Phi's Grand Council for the 1995–97 biennium was installed. Six members are continuing on the Council, with the addition of one new member.

Former Grand Vice President of Collegians Beth van Maanen Beatty will serve the Fraternity as the new Grand President, Grand President Emeritus Alice Weber Johnson, who first met Beth as a Texas Gamma collegian, performed a beautiful installation ceremony, making Beth the Fraternity's 19th Grand President. Beth van Maanen Beatty graduated from Texas Tech University with a B.A. in Spanish/business. Under Beth's helm as Chapter President, Texas Gamma won the Balfour Cup in 1958, when the chapter was only five years old. Following graduation, she was hired as Graduate Counselor (now called Resident Graduate Consultant) for Florida Gamma at Rollins College. Beth has served as President, Treasurer and Alumnae Club Rush Information Chairman of the Bay Area, Texas Alumnae Club, Province Coordinator and Collegiate Province President. In addition, she has been Second Alternate Delegate to the National Panhellenic Conference, Director of Academic Standards and Grand Secretary. An avid sports fan, Beth, between Pi Phi work and family, often can be found exercising on her treadmill while reading Sports Illustrated.

fter four years of service as Pi Beta Phi's Grand President and four years as Grand Vice President of Collegians, Jo Ann Minor Roderick retired from Grand Council at the 1995 Convention. In a tribute to Jo Ann at the Wine Carnation Banquet, fellow Grand Council member Carolyn Lesh shared, "Jo Ann led us to improve our view of the Fraternity and the Greek system as a whole by widening our scope of vision-our range of perceptions, thoughts and actions. By widening our scope, Grand Council made the choice to accept changes, to better understand, and to grow in our thinking. She led us to see a lighter, brighter and grander view."

To honor Jo Ann, beginning with the 1995–96 awards, the Top Ten Chapter Awards will be known as the Jo Ann Minor Roderick Chapters of Excellence Awards. In addition, the Pi Beta Phi Foundation announced they



will give a collegiate scholarship in her honor.

The final salute to Jo Ann came nearly an hour after the Wine Carnation Banquet when convention attendees gathered on all floors of the hotel's eightstory atrium lobby to serenade the outgoing Grand President. "Remember" and "My Pi Phi Girl" filled the atrium as Pi Phis, many arm in arm, sang with heartfelt thanks for all that Jo Ann had done for Pi Beta Phi.

Not one to sit still for long, Jo Ann has already begun her next Pi Phi job, as Graduate Consultant Coordinator. She is a former **Collegiate** Province President and Director of Academic Standards who is looking forward to going back to her work with collegiate chapters on the local level as well. Oklahoma Beta, her own chapter, will benefit from her years of experience as she returns to their Alumnae Advisory Committee.

My favorite part of any sporting eventthe Olympics, NCAA Final Four, U.S. Openis the "highlight reel," or five minutes of clips edited to music recapping the occasion. I have found that with major events in my own life, I develop my own "highlight reel" of images. The year 1995, though still three months shy of its end, has already brought numerous images to mind. They include ... O.J. Simpson sitting in the courtroom ... an Oklahoma City fireman cradling a young child ... Captain Scott O'Grady in uniform recalling the details of his survival in enemy territory ... and the most recent, cadets in the quadrangle of the Citadel celebrating after Shannon Faulkner's departure from the institution.

There are a myriad of sides one could take with the Citadel issue. Some people think Shannon should never have been allowed to attend the South Carolina military academy; others cannot believe that the public-supported institution in its 153 years of existence has never admitted women. Some agreed with the school's eleventh-hour plea that Ms. Faulkner was not physically fit to endure the Citadel regime; others believe she should have been in better shape and then, could have handled it.

I'm not going to attempt to make a political statement here, though I do have my own opinion ... this, coming from the first girl on the boys cross country team in high school. You would have had to carry me out of the Citadel on a stretcher.

Whatever your own opinion on the matter, I'd like to ask one question. Would Shannon have been stronger had she not been alone? When other service-affiliated institutions have gone coed, it was done en masse, by a class of women. Nineteen years after the first class of 119 women entered West Point, Rebecca Marier graduated first in the 1995 class.

In light of current circumstances, I am further impressed with the pioneering spirits of the twelve Founders of Pi Beta Phi. Nearly 130 years ago, these young women had the vision to form the first national secret society for women, at a time when only five state universities admitted women. They were courageous and determined to make a place for their sex in the arena of higher learning. One of their tenets of existence was to offer support to other pathbreaking women entering college.

As we go to press, other women's issues surround me-the United Nations-sponsored Women's Conference in China, the 75th anniversary of the 19th amendment and a fight to bring the statue of women's suffrage leaders from the basement of the U.S. Capitol to a more appropriate and honorable place-and I realize, we still have trails to blaze.



So much has happened during the past biennium and it has gone by so quickly. It seems we just left Orlando and the magic of friendship in Pi Beta Phi and here we are venturing west—blazing new trails and reaching new heights. I don't generally talk about world news—in fact, I try to

avoid the news because it always seems so depressing. But, since I live in Oklahoma, the bombing of the Federal Building in Oklahoma City has been on my mind and the focus of all news media. That devastating act of violence changed our lives. Oklahomans, together with the entire nation, joined hands to embrace the victims and their families. The courage, caring and generosity were overwhelming. Even the toughest news commentators struggled with emotions while telling stories of victims, rescuers and volunteers.

It is amazing how this affected those of us who live in Oklahoma, and the effect it had on our nation has been incredible. Our hearts have grown with each tear shed. We all thought this could never happen in Oklahoma ... the heartland ... the Bible belt ... a safe environment ... a place where the "good guys" live.

When describing the rescue workers, medical teams and volunteers, the media often referred to them as just "ordinary people who have become heroes." The rescue workers replied, "We're not heroes, we're just doing our job!"

As you might expect, Pi Phis played a major role in these heroic efforts. Past Phi Alumnae Province President and a new member on Arrowmont's Board of Governors Sue Ann White Hyde, who provides a true spark of leadership in our Fraternity, is Chairman of the Board for the Oklahoma County Red Cross. She spent every day and night at either the bombing site or in the Red Cross facility until the workers all left and the families were consoled. When I talked with Sue Ann, we both fought back tears as she told of Pi Phis being involved everywhere ... cooking all night for rescue workers, working with the FBI, helping as doctors, nurses and psychologistsworking through organizations such as Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts and churches, providing comfort for friends and families of the victims. The Oklahoma collegiate chapters served as drop-off sites in their communities for donations to the relief funds and personally participated in the immense task of providing necessities and raising money for rescue workers and victimized families, as well as standing in line to donate blood. The list could go on and on. As Sue Ann said, "If you want something done, pick up the phone ... they will be there ... the members of Pi Beta Phi." And Sue Ann is definitely one of those ordinary people who became a hero!

Every time I heard that phrase, I thought of some of the women I know—the leaders of Pi Beta Phi ... the volunteers, courageous, caring and generous ... willing to step forth and lead the way ... willing to step forth and lead the way ... willing to work in the trenches ... just "ordinary people doing extraordinary things," willing to be our heroes.

Pi Phi has celebrated with women like this from the beginning, starting with those 12 young women who founded Pi Beta Phi. Did they ever do something extraordinary! Could they possibly have known I.C. or Pi Beta Phi would be flourishing 128 years later, initiating over 184,000 women, with 128 collegiate chapters spread throughout the United States and in Canada, and over 370 alumnae organizations spread throughout the world. Did these young women ever dream they would be considered heroines? They are!

We have also celebrated with Dr. May L. Keller, Emma Harper Turner and Anna Pettit as they traveled the difficult trails through the Smoky Mountains to establish a Settlement School—determined that the most needy district should be the one which Pi Beta Phi would enter. And the Pi Phis brought education and health care to Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Talk about doing extraordinary things! These Pi Phis were giants—and heroes to many!

And today, we continue our philanthropic efforts in Gatlinburg as the Arrowmont School of Arts & Crafts was just recently enhanced by a very successful capital campaign, many thanks to Chairman Jean Scott, the Capital Campaign Committee and many Pi Phi participants. Our students are enjoying the new dormitory, a new painting and drawing studio, Artist-in-Residence Studios and soon, a state-of-the-art wood studio. And the mission to "enrich lives through art" is as relevant today as the Settlement School was 85 years ago.

Today our financial security for educational and philanthropic purposes comes from the Pi Beta Phi Foundation, the fund-raising arm for the Fraternity. It was only through the foresight and determination of Past Grand President Carolyn Lichtenberg, the generosity of former Grand President Emeritus Marianne Reid Wild who left her estate to establish the Foundation, and the "get up and go" of the perfect Foundation President Ann Phy, that the future of our Fraternity, Pi Beta Phi Foundation, was established. What they have accomplished over the past five years is extraordinary!

It is pretty easy to look back in the past and praise all the right decisions made, and all the worthy goals accomplished. It is easy to spot those heroes. But I want you to look at the women of the '90s ... look at their accomplishments ... look at their challenges ... look at their future—our future.

This past year our collegians had a combined GPA of 3.025, the highest GPA ever. Sixty-eight chapters were above a 3.0, and 35 of them were above a 3.14. The dollars and hours collegians have given to philanthropic

efforts is phenomenal, and they share their leadership abilities with the entire campus. The meaningful activities they promote and honors individuals and chapters receive are impressive, and yet, campuses are seeing a decline in interest in the Greek system and rush numbers continue to decrease; extension opportunities are few. They say on some campuses the top students are not interested because they only see the "parties and the fluff," and they don't think they have time for us, or they don't want to spend their hard earned dollars that way.

Why can't they see we offer a young woman leadership opportunities, academic support and a lifetime of friendship, a chance for a better quality of life? Perhaps we need a new sales approach, perhaps our advertising isn't saying the right thing and perhaps it is time for some changes. I know we hate that word "change," but look at how fast our world is changing and look at the needs of the women in the '90s. We must streamline from top to bottom, we must be less demanding of our officers and our members. We must make some changes. The woman of the '90s is busy. She is committed, intelligent, talented and she does it all, or tries to do it all. She carries a heavy class load, works part- or full-time, is a leader in campus organizations, is involved in philanthropic endeavors and lives in a very competitive world. She lives on a challenging campus. She is a great Pi Phi officer and a loving member. She is a good friend and she needs friends. Where do they find time for themselves? I can't imagine, but I do know we need to determine what is important and we need to go for it.

Educators say college students are turning more to courses that reflect their search for the meaning in life. There is a new emphasis on ethics and values, the effects of science and technology on society, love and justice. This is a big change from a decade ago when students sought an edge to compete for the highest-paying job.

Educators have found students are increasingly interested in courses deal-

ing with quality-of-life issues. This tells us students are interested in things outside themselves, in society and in their communities, in environmental concerns and helping people in need. Yet, there is still room for fun. They have a love of life. These sound like wonderful young people—they sound like our future heroes! They sound like Pi Phis!

Perhaps this criticism and slight decline have been a blessing in disguise because it has made the groups in the Greek system look internally. We are not going to sit back and watch a bomb destroy the Greek system. We must begin to create a security system, to protect something we hold dear, and something we hope to share with many generations to come. As we prepare for the future, we honor our past. We want to preserve that heritage of excellence.

We are also challenged in the alumnae department as we are involved in an era when women are searching for free time, involved in competitive careers, young families, care of aging parents, on and on. We are facing a shrinking volunteer force ... and there is a need to prioritize activities outside the home and career. Is Pi Phi a priority? When you think about it, are we ever too old or too busy for friends? Yes, Pi Phi should be a priority and our alumnae department is diligently working to meet the needs of that busy '90s woman. With all the young leaders attending convention as Alumnae Delegates and representing Alumnae Advisory Committees and Chapter House Corporations, I would say our alumnae clubs are doing something right. It has been extremely encouraging to see the interest of our young members. Our future is not yet fixedwe are in the process of creating it.

Pi Phi has a leadership opportunity of a lifetime as we enter the chairmanship of the National Panhellenic Conference this fall. Jean Scott will represent Pi Phi as the incoming chairman and she has already instigated strategic planning with all the "alphabet organizations involved," as well as the NPC groups. Jean's leadership comes at a time it is most needed, and Jean is one of those ordinary people who will do extraordinary things—she will make a difference in the future of the Greek system. Perhaps I should say, she is making a difference!

During the past biennium the Constitution & Statutes and Policies & Standing Rules have been revised and will be voted upon at this convention, a new streamlined pledge program has been introduced and served as a pilot program for almost half of our chapters. We have laid the groundwork for future streamlining with a new Manual and Mailings format. We have made many improvements in Central Office procedures, thanks to a staff with a great deal of foresight. We have been delighted with the results from the Collegiate Leadership Seminars and the Alumnae Leadership Retreats. We do have a long way to go, but we are creating the future! I happen to think we have an outstanding Grand Council and I love them dearly, but we have to give a great deal of credit for our successes to our dedicated Directors, province and appointed officers. And, we have to give a lot of thanks to Past Grand Council members who have advised and supported us all the way.

It is pretty awesome to play a leadership role in this truly great Fraternity, in fact it is pretty awesome just to be a member of Pi Beta Phi because our membership is made up of phenomenal women. I am speaking of you. Look at you, you are all pretty ordinary women, but you all do extraordinary things or you wouldn't be here. You are the movers and the shakers, the decision makers, you are our stability and you are our future.

Where this crazy world of ours is headed, I do not know. But I do know Pi Phi is going to be there, to continue to give women the support and the courage to be heroes ... to be just ordinary women doing extraordinary things!

Details about the eligibility requirements along with the application forms will be available in the fall of 1995 and will be delivered to each group by the delegate or alternate for the sorority. For this academic year, the Cleveland Alumnae Panhellenic Association is awarding 12, \$900 scholarships to area collegians.

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Ambassadors Fill Communication Gap

A group of Pi Phis has formed for the purpose of promoting awareness of Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts. Each has experienced classes there first hand and is committed to Arrowmont through speaking engagements with collegiate chapters and alumnae clubs.

It is the job of Arrowmont's Ambassadors to inform members of the Fraternity about the programs, projects, goals and state of the school, emphasizing its importance as the traditional philanthropy of Pi Beta Phi.

"Our role is to raise the level of awareness, not to raise money," explains Oregon Alpha Deborah Coburn Rice, an ambassador from Saratoga, California. "We want to instill some real pride in Arrowmont because people don't know that much about it. They're at a distance (from the school) or they've been out of college for awhile."

Deborah understands that a lot of people never visit Arrowmont because it is so far away. "At my second presentation, which was at the University of Oregon, one young woman wanted to know more about it and asked a lot of questions." Deborah helped her submit a scholarship application.

"This was a day or two before the scholarship applications had to be in thank heaven we have modern day faxes and phones and Federal Express. It was wonderful ... I was able to say, 'wait a minute. We can put this together for you and at least give you an opportunity to apply.'"

Their efforts were successful. When asked what has surprised her the most during her initial presentations, Tennessee Beta Lynn Mayes Sanders of Dunwoody, Georgia said, "I've just been floored that nobody knows very much (about Arrowmont). My opening remark is, 'can anyone give me a one-sentence description of Arrowmont,' and they can't. That's pretty amazing." But that is why the Arrowmont Ambassador Program was founded. In the first year of the program, Lynn has talked to several collegians who are especially interested in attending.

Members who have already heard ambassador presentations have been very responsive according to Texas Beta

Lucy Harrison from Sarasota, Florida. "There is a lot of confusion in the minds of members, particularly older members. You have to remember the demographics of where I live. If you ask all of the Golden Arrows to stand up, there

are very few people left seated. When they were pledges, Arrowmont was a settlement school, and there are misconceptions about what has happened to Arrowcraft. I had one member tell me 'well you know, Arrowmont is defunct.' I said no it's not and she said, 'yes it is.'" Lucy assured her that Arrowmont is alive and well and getting better every day!

Arrowmont continues to have its roots in the original Settlement School in Gatlinburg, says board member California Eta Barbara Whitney of Santa Monica, California. "While its focus might be said to be more narrowly oriented to the arts, its effect is actually more broad, since so many of its students are teachers and artists who spread the benefits of attending Arrowmont to others around the country and the world."

That Pi Phis make the school happen, Barbara says, is an amazing accomplishment. "Art has the power to transform lives and to develop one's critical thinking. Arrowmont contributes to that power through the experiences it offers; it continues to be worthy of our support and pride."

Heritage Hall Renamed to Honor Margaret Elkin Hughes

On May 4, 1995, a beautiful evening at Arrowmont, a group of Pi Phis and invited guests walked up the hill to Heritage Hall. They assembled casually in the secluded hollow above the Red Barn to dedicate Arrowmont's new dorm and to honor Kentucky Alpha Margaret Elkin Hughes.

Standing in front of the dorm, on the former site of a neglected apple orchard, Arrowmont Board of Governors Chairman Charlotte Ann (C.A.) Eckel Edwards, Arkansas Alpha, addressed the crowd. She thanked everyone for coming and applauded the many generous donors who helped make the dorm a reality.

"Until today," she added, "we have called this housing complex Heritage Hall. Today, we dedicate this dorm to a very special Pi Phi who left her entire estate to Arrowmont. Her name is Margaret Elkin Hughes, a Kentucky Alpha from the University of Louisville. Ms. Hughes was born in 1905. Her father was a financier and a noted civic leader in Kentucky. Her hobby was traveling. At the age of 12 she traveled to the Orient, and in her '20s went around the world. Through her travels, she became interested in the arts and amassed a collection of tapestries, furniture and art objects. Ms. Hughes was an avid reader and an active member of the Presbyterian Church. She died in 1989, leaving her estate to Arrowmont.

"We are exceedingly grateful for her love of the Settlement School, which resulted in this extremely generous gift. In honor of Margaret Hughes and her generosity, the Board of Governors hereby names this housing complex Hughes Hall."

Hughes Hall Wings Named for Two Pi Phis

While C.A. explained that the housing complex is comprised of two wings—the Marianne Reid Wild Wing and the larger wing which was still unnamed—Jean Wirths Scott stood at the edge of the crowd unaware of the honor she was to receive. She listened tranquilly as C.A. announced, "Today the Board of Governors wants to name and dedicate this building to a person who is very special to Pi Beta Phi; a person without whom this dream would never have been realized. I'd like to ask Jean Scott to step forward and join us."

Every eye turned toward Jean as her mouth fell open and she stared in disbelief. She then made her way to the front of the crowd and heard C.A. announce, "Jean is a former Grand President of Pi Beta Phi and the Chairman of the Capital Campaign for Arrowmont. She has dedicated these past few years to raising \$2.8 million for the Arrowmont Capital Campaign. She has donated countless hours on behalf of Arrowmont. There is actually never any way we could repay her for her selfless dedication. But she knows what is in our hearts, and from this day forward every student, every Pi Phi and every visitor who walks through these doors will know that the name of Jean Wirths Scott has a special meaning to Pi Beta Phi and to Arrowmont. On behalf of the Board of Governors, I hereby name this the Jean Wirths Scott Wing."

The Jean Wirths Scott Wing is the larger of two buildings that comprise Hughes Hall. The wing houses single and double rooms, a lounge decorated with photographs from early Settlement School days, a one-bedroom apartment for distinguished visitors, and a lovely screened porch furnished with heavy wicker furniture. A covered bridge provides access to the Marianne Reid Wild Wing on the opposite side of a mountain stream.



Jean Scott's reaction was one of surprise when she learned that a wing of Hughes Hall would be named in her honor.

The Marianne Reid Wild Wing is smaller and cottage-like, featuring eight single and double rooms with private bath facilities. It was named after a woman who loved the Fraternity. "As you know," C.A. said, "Marianne was a former Grand President of Pi Beta Phi who cared very deeply for the Settlement School. Because of her love for the school, she left a generous portion of her estate to Arrowmont and we have named the wing in her honor."

Marianne was elected Grand President in 1952, after many years of service to the Fraternity. A role model, leader and mentor to all, she served in this office until 1958. As a tribute to her devotion and commitment, the Fraternity named her Grand President Emeritus in 1966.

Pi Beta Phi became Marianne's family following the deaths of her husband and son, and she named the Pi Beta Phi Foundation as beneficiary of her will.

The Foundation trustees chose to honor her memory by designating a portion of her bequest for Arrowmont to build and name the Marianne Reid Wild Wing of the Margaret Elkin Hughes Hall.

Framed documents honoring Kentucky Alpha Margaret Elkin Hughes, Kansas Alpha Marianne Reid Wild, and Pennsylvania Beta Jean Wirths Scott were on display in Arrowmont's main building following the dedication of Hughes Hall.

Illinois Zeta Cynthia Dolan Gabrielli of Springfield, Virginia said an unexpected benefit of the weekend was seeing the other five classes in session. She said they gave her "new ideas, plus the desire to take those courses in the future."

Ohio Beta Carol Hagaman Miller from Pinehurst, North Carolina, came for her first Arts Weekend with three others from the Sandhills, North Carolina Alumnae Club. Noting that leadership education is a primary focus of the Fraternity, Foundation President Ann Phy says, "The Foundation Trustees are committed to securing permanent funding to ensure the continuance and development of quality leadership education for the members of our collegiate chapters."

Strong, capable leadership is essential to the well-being of any organization. Pi Beta Phi leadership seminars and programming provide the skills and tools needed to effectively deal with decisions faced by chapter officers. The chapter is a supportive environment in which to practice these leadership skills based on the founding principles of Pi Beta Phi.

The size of the potential endowment was daunting until Trustees began to think of funding *each chapter* as a separate unit. A \$25,000 gift will provide adequate funding for program-



ming at the biennial convention and the Collegiate Leadership Seminars in alternate years. As with all endowments, the principal will be invested and only the income will be used to fund the leadership program. Each endowed unit may be named for the donor or to honor or memorialize a person or chapter.

Several potential donors were approached with the concept of endowing their chapter's leadership education funding needs. The proposal has met with enthusiastic success.

The Fondren Foundation of Houston, Texas has granted \$50,000 for leadership education endowments to benefit Texas Alpha Chapter at the University of Texas and Texas Beta Chapter at Southern Methodist University. In Oklahoma City, an energetic group of alumnae have pledged to enlist 50 Pi Phis to invest \$1,000 each to secure endowments for Oklahoma Alpha at the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma Beta at Oklahoma State University. Texas Alpha and Texas Beta Chapters had strong representation at Pi Beta Phi's 1995 Convention in Palm Desert, California because of leadership education endowments.




